

BLUDEST PAGE IN HISTORY

The nations of the world should unite in taking action to prevent any mad dog nation from running amok and murdering and outraging the helpless, declared Bishop James Cannon of the Southern Methodist church in an address last Sunday afternoon in Greensboro, N. C.

One of the awful outrages of the Near East, at Smyrna, elsewhere—a succession of horrors, butcheries, attacks upon women, thousands made orphans—a long list of crimes.

Bishop Cannon, back only a short time from the Near East, had seen enough with his own eyes to demand vigorous measures being taken to prevent a repetition of the horrors, he said. He urged the people to write to their senators and representatives in Congress and tell them of the necessity of the administration taking action. The bloodiest, blackest page in all the history of the Turks was what he called recent massacres and the consequent refusal of Christian nations to act vigorously. He called it a disgrace to civilization.

Bishop Cannon told of urging Secretary of State Hughes to make vigorous protest against Turkish atrocities, he said, and Mr. Hughes responded that the language of the protest suggested by the Methodist church "was too strong;" it might mean war. It would not mean war, Bishop Cannon said, but it would mean that the Turk would not dare to butcher should the nations send their ships to the troubled zone.

He was told at Geneva by representatives of the allied nations, attending a meeting of the League of Nations assembly, that the whole world would join in restraining the Turk if America would raise her voice in common action against the barbarities.

NOTICE is hereby given that the TAX-BOOKS for York County will be opened on MONDAY, the 20TH DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1922, and will remain open until the 31ST DAY OF DECEMBER, 1922, for the collection of STATE, COUNTY, SCHOOL and LOCAL TAXES, for the fiscal year 1922, without penalty; after which day ONE PER CENT penalty will be added to all payments made in the month of JANUARY, 1923, and TWO PER CENT penalty for all payments made in the month of FEBRUARY, 1923, and SEVEN PER CENT penalty will be added for all payments made from the 1ST DAY OF MARCH, 1923, to the 15TH DAY OF MARCH, 1923, and after this date all unpaid taxes will go into execution and all unpaid Single Polls will be turned over to the several Magistrates for prosecution in accordance with law.

All of the Banks of the county will offer their accommodations and facilities to Taxpayers who may desire to make use of the same, and I shall take pleasure in giving prompt attention to all correspondence on the subject.

All Taxpayers appearing at my office will receive prompt attention.

Note—The Tax Books are made up by Townships, and parties writing about Taxes will always expedite matters if they will mention the Township or Townships in which their property or properties are located.

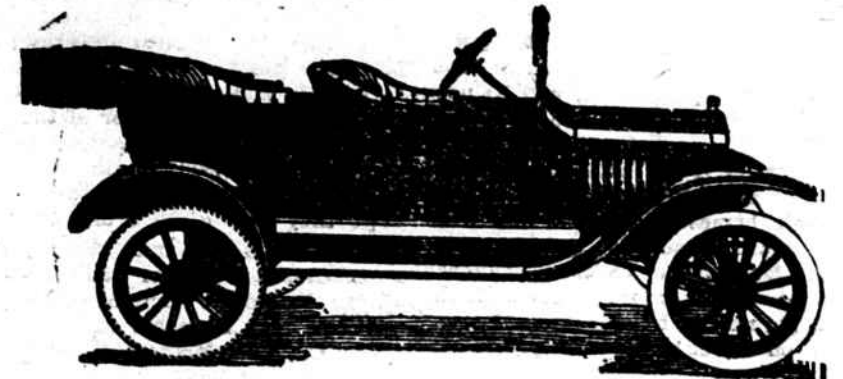
