

**NEWS ABOUT TOWN.**

Mrs. Sue Bailes, wife of J. Z. Bailes, of the Pleasant Valley neighborhood in Lancaster county, has been critically ill at her home for several days. Yesterday Mrs. Bailes' condition was reported slightly improved.

The town authorities of Fort Mill have decided to allow the discharge of firecrackers and other fireworks in town on December 25 and 26 in celebration of the Christmas holidays.

The attendance at the night school for adult filiates which opened several nights ago at the Fort Mill graded school was decidedly encouraging to those in charge. The school will run for several months and it is thought that the enrollment will be augmented by a number of additional pupils after the Christmas holidays.

While there has been a considerable drop in the temperature in upper South Carolina during the last 48 hours, the blizzard which was forecast for this section by the national weather bureau for Wednesday failed to materialize. Many people in the Fort Mill community, however, have taken advantage of the colder weather to butcher hogs.

Two forces of hands are now at work improving the public road between the town limits and Bailes' bridge under the contract awarded several weeks ago by the Fort Mill township bond commission. Work on the Steele Creek road between the town and the North Carolina line also is being pushed, but on both undertakings progress has been somewhat impeded during the last ten days on account of unfavorable weather conditions. The statement was made last night that the improvement of the Steele Creek road probably would not be completed before March 1.

W. B. Meacham and Arthur C. Lytle spent Monday in Columbia attending a good roads meeting which had been called by Governor Harvey. A good roads association was formed as a result of the meeting and a full set of officers elected, including a vice president for each of the State's seven congressional districts. The vice president for the 5th congressional district is Col. T. B. Spratt of Fort Mill. At the meeting it was decided to ask the Legislature at its next session to provide for a big bond issue for road improvements.

**Railroads Solve Snow Problem.**

Some are the days when... at a time. Back in the '90s and even in the earlier part of the present century hundreds of men worked weeks at a time to clear mountain tracks but now huge snow fighting machines are in use in the sections of the country where the snowfall is heaviest and the delay to traffic has consequently been reduced to hours.

Several of the Northwestern railroads equip their locomotives with "flangers," attached near the wheels, which force the snow from the rails to the side. At all terminals of these roads wedge plows are stationed, awaiting calls from any section. In the mountain districts the rotary plow is used, which burrows through the snow, whirling it from the tracks.

**Ancient Relics Worth Millions.**

Twelve million dollars is a conservative estimate of the value of relics found on the site of the ancient Thebes, near Luxor, Egypt, according to information from an exploring party which uncovered the treasure. The information adds that the quantity of relics found may exceed the capacity of the museum at Cairo, Egypt.

Two sealed chambers have been opened, but there remain several others, one of which is believed to be the tomb of King Tutankhamun, who reigned in the year 1350 B. C. These chambers will remain unopened until more diggers and officials arrive in about six weeks.
