R. Z. Wright, of the U. S. Navy received his discharge last week and is at home again.

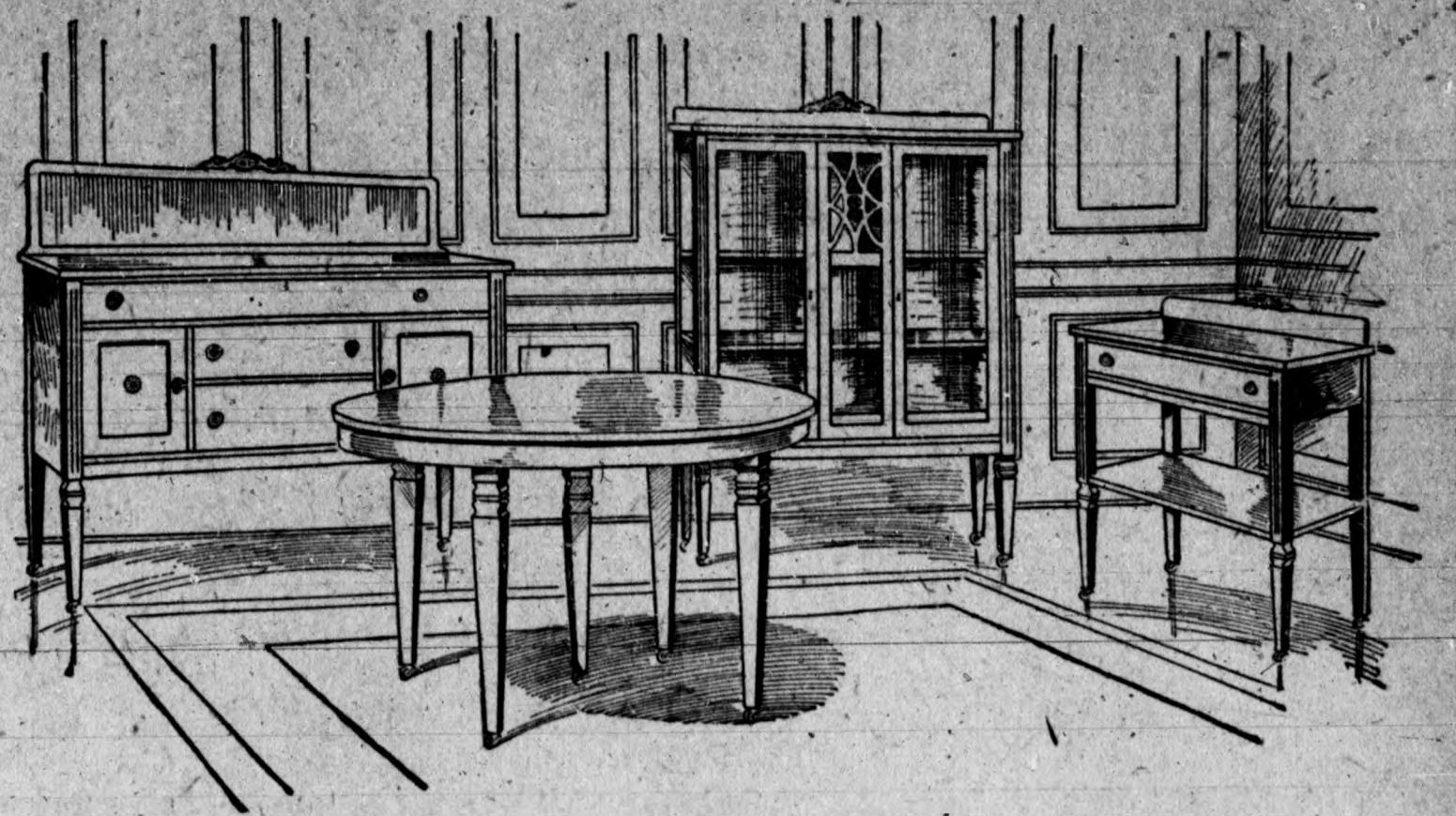

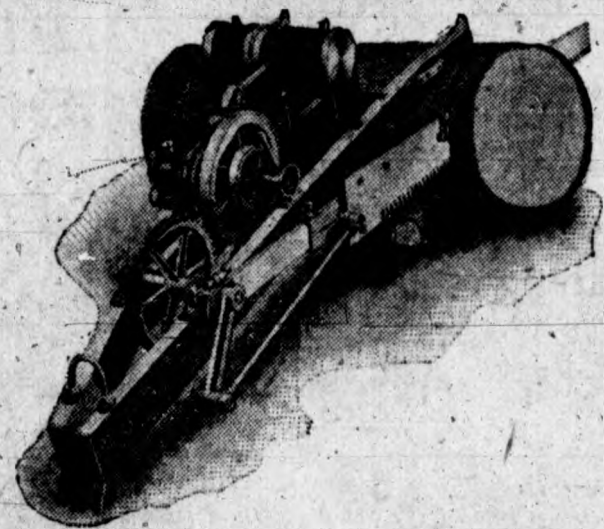
