

Director Hines Approves Plan to Stimulate New Construction Work. Those who are interested in construction work, especially as it applies to building, will read with interest the following statement in a Wash

As a step toward increasing building activities throughout the country which is the one immediate hope of reducing unemployment, the United States Railroad Administration will in a few days cut down the freight rates handling materials, all description, from the present high level to the pre-war staundard. The proposal, put forward by some of the leading economics in the country, has met the approval of Walker D.-Hines, Director

The cut will apply to material for general construction, in the hope that private interests will seize the oppor-

Such a cut would, of course, reduce the price of lumber, bricks, cement and structural steel, and would be an invitation to go ahead with the work, that, in turn, would give employment to a very large number of mechanics.
