### CIVIL WAR IS REGARDED AS IMMINENT IN MUNICH

Berlin, April 12.—Civil war in Munich is regarded as imminent, following the action of the communists in deposing the revolutionary council republic. Three would-be governments are now in existence in Bavaria.

The first act of the communists was the election of a council of ten which was proclaimed in power. Armed bands then stormed the police station, disarming the police and arresting several officials as hostages. The communists were aided by the Russian bolshevik leader, Dr. Levien, who recently returned from Russia.

The peasants' ban on the shipment of food to Munich, which has been in effect since last Tuesday, is operating with disastrous effects. Augsburg is likewise cut off from food shipments.

Pamphlets are being distributed calling on the population to rise up against the Jews.
