For Richmond and Alexandria prices add 75 per ton to port prices. When deliveries are made in less than car load lots the difference in freight is also to be added. In cases where farmers buy in less than 30 ton lots and buy through dealers the dealer's prices for handling the goods (usually \$2 per ton) is to be added. These prices include a 5 per cent. discount of paid in cash on December and usually an additional one half per cent. is granted for each full month when cash settlement is made before that date.
