NOTICE OF ELECTION.
State of South Carolina,
County of Laurens.

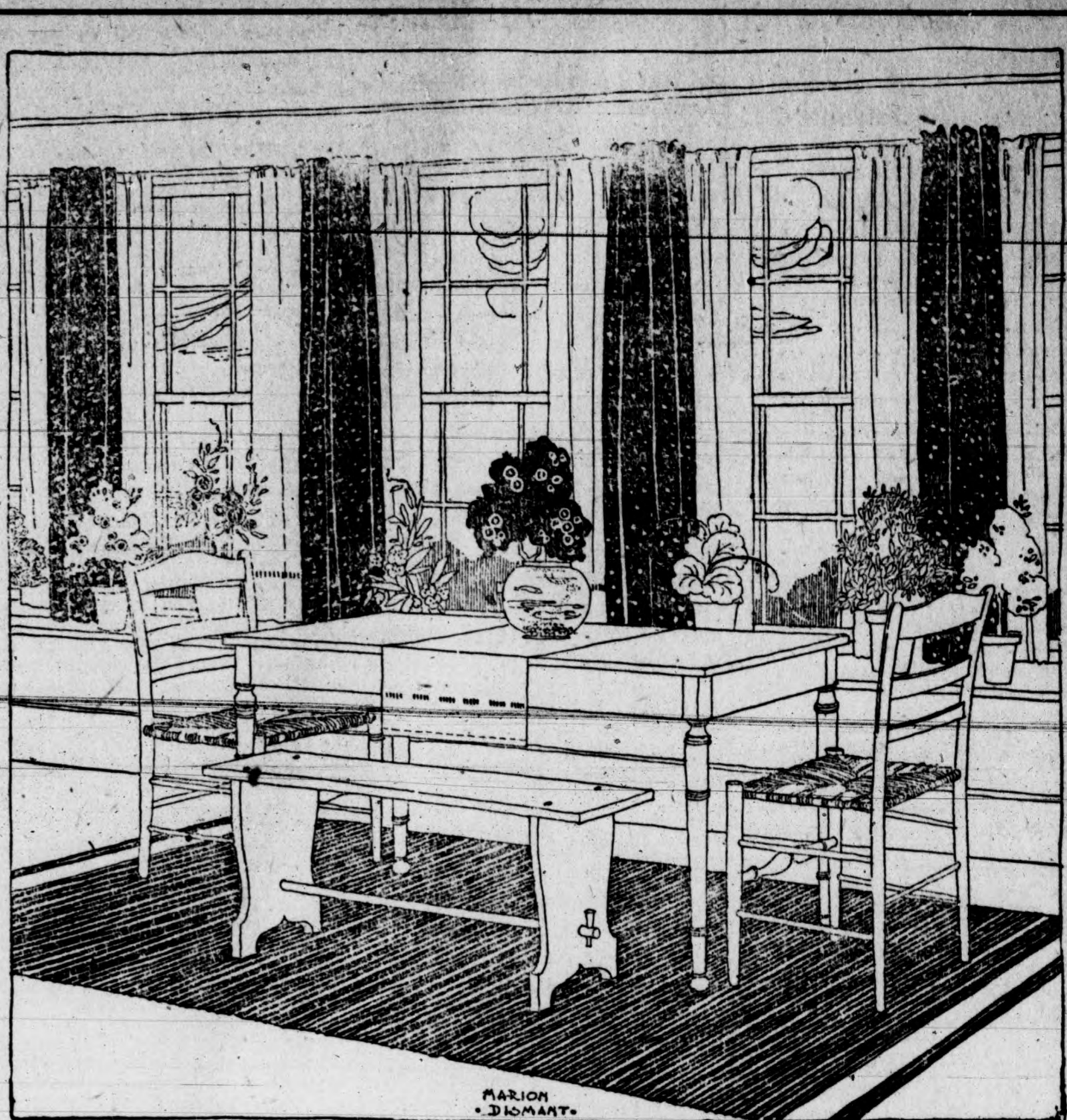
Whereas, petitions signed by a legal number of the qualified electors and free-holders residing in Cross Hill school district No. 3, Laurens county, South Carolina, asking for an election upon the question of voting an additional 4 mill tax upon the property in said school district, to be used for school purposes, have been filed with the county board of education, an election is hereby ordered upon said question, said election to be held on the 13th day of December, 1919, at Spring Grove school building in said district, under the management of the trustees of said school district.

Only such electors as return real or personally property for taxation and who exhibit their tax receipts and registration certificates as required in the general election shall be allowed to vote.

Those favoring the 4 mill additional tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "YES" written or printed thereon. Those against the 4 mill additional tax shall vote a ballot containing the word "NO" written or printed thereon. Polls shall open at the hour of 8 o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until the hour of 4 o'clock in the afternoon when they shall be closed, and the ballots counted.

The trustees shall report the result of the election to the county auditor and county superintendent of education within ten days thereafter.
