COUNTY TREASURER'S NOTICE

The books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of taxes for the fiscal year, 1927, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31, 1927. After December 31, one per cent will be added. After January 31st, two per cent will be added, and after Feb. 28th, seven per cent will be added, until the 15th day of March, 1928, when the books will be closed.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located. This is important, as additional cost and penalty may be attached.

All able-bodied male citizens between the ages of twenty-one (21) and sixty (60) years of age are liable to pay a poll tax of \$1.00, except old soldiers, who are exempt as fifty (50) years of age. Commutation Road Tax \$1.50 in lieu of road duty. All able-bodied men between the ages of 21 and 55 are liable to road duty except those in military service, school trustees, school teachers, ministers, and students. Dog Tax \$1.25, which must be paid not later than January 31, 1928.

Proper attention will be given those who wish to pay their taxes through the mail by check, money order, etc., giving name of township and number of school district.

America's Far-Reaching New Industry

Babson Park, Mass., Dec. 28.—Mr. Babson was today asked for his views concerning the great new tourist industry which has come to be so popular throughout the country during recent years. As this is a subject which affects practically everyone, Mr. Babson's statements should be of interest to the reader.

Material Industries Not Greatest

"When discussing great industries, the common belief is that America's greatest industries are of a material nature. Yet an analysis brings about the astounding conclusion that the greatest industry of all is the tourist industry. Whether one studies the railroad situation, the automobile situation, hotel business, or whatever one studies, it leads to this definite conclusion. It requires only a comparatively few people in the world today to manufacture the necessities of life. The great bulk of people are engaged in industries which one day were looked upon as luxuries. This includes all forms of entertainment, many forms of travel, and a great many other things which make life today much easier than in the time of our grandfathers.

"One of the greatest industries in New England is the tourist industry. This is evidenced by the following figures. A very conservative estimate for the past year's tourist business in New England is \$250,000,000. The state of Maine alone figures tourists spent about \$100,000,000 in that state. Over a million people from other states came to Maine last year for sight-seeing, camping, hunting, and various recreations. New Hampshire with its beautiful White Mountains has for many years been a 'mecca' for tourists and vacationists, but only recently has it developed fame as a winter resort. Some predict that New England will become another 'Switzerland' for winter sports, so rapidly is this form of recreation gaining popularity. In the summertime, seashore resorts are attracting increasing numbers to the beautiful New England coast each year. Land values have risen accordingly. The glorious mountain ranges of New Hampshire, Vermont, and western Massachusetts are yearly becoming more attractive to summer tourists. Connecticut, a densely populated state, nevertheless has a big tourist business. Over 730,656 people visited state parks of Connecticut last year, which is nearly half as many as visited all the national parks in the country.

1927 Shows Increase

"I have recently made an analysis of reports on the tourist business sent me from the chambers of commerce in ninety-seven representative cities throughout the country and find that this industry is growing by leaps and bounds. Out of the total of ninety-seven reports, I find seventy-five showing an increase in the number of tourists, while only eleven cities show any signs of a decrease. The remaining eleven cities witnessed normal conditions for the first ten months of the year. As a matter of interest, I might name the following cities to show the percentage of increase in the tourist business for the first ten months. Portland, Maine, shows a gain of from 5 per cent to 10 per cent; Fort Worth, Texas, an increase of 20 per cent; Galveston, Texas, 25 per cent; Duluth, Minnesota, 35 per cent; Cleveland, Ohio, 40 per cent; while Shreveport, La., shows an estimated increase of 200 per cent.

"Two cities report a slight decrease in the number of visiting tourists, but in both cases I find that surrounding cities have witnessed an increase. In an interview recently I made considerable mention of the importance of good roads. This is especially true when one considers the influx of tourists to sections where pains have been taken to have good highways. The opening of a new million dollar highway across the Ohio river is given as the reason for the increase in the number of tourists to Huntington, W. Va.

Outlook for Winter Business

"The large number of conventions held this year is stated to have drawn many tourists to the national capital at Washington. In Fort Wayne, Ind., it is estimated that about two and one-half million tourists visited the city in 1926, and this year there is reported to have been an even greater number. As a whole, this has been a very good year for people in many lines which are patronized by the tourist. As this includes almost all lines of business, it can readily be seen that general business is greatly benefited by a good tourist business. As an indicator of general business at the present time, we find the Babson chart registering at about normal.
