Marine Forces Ordered Reduced In Nicaragua

Washington, Jan. 7.—The United States marine force in Nicaragua will be reduced shortly by 1,228 men under orders announced today by Secretary Wilbur. This will leave a force of approximately 3,500 marines on duty in the Central American republic.

The force left in Nicaragua will include an aviation detachment and officers and men assigned to the Nicaraguan National Guard.

The battle and scouting fleets are scheduled to start south tomorrow for winter maneuvers off Panama; and the marines probably will be picked up after the maneuvers are completed.
