Pursuant to call, a meeting of the Confederate veterans was held at the court house today to consider the subject of asking the legislature to increase the pension fund, so as to be put a little nearer the amount other states are paying. Figures were produced, showing that South Carolina is paying \$132.00 a year; Mississippi pays \$199.00; Oklahoma \$300.00; Louisiana \$300.00; Virginia \$320.00; Tennessee \$300.00; Georgia \$290.00; North Carolina \$420.00; Florida \$540.

There is no sort of reason for this difference in the amount paid by the states. The state service was common to all the states, and can't raise the question of the burden of taxation; this too, is common to all.

It was shown that the veterans of With their up-to-date dry cleaning Greenville had adopted a resolution asking for an increase of the pension fund so as to pay to each the sum of \$300.00 per annum. This is a moderate demand, in view of the small sum being paid heretofore.

> It was shown that there was fiftyone (51) persons in the Soldiers home, 32 soldiers, 19 wives and widows, at a per capita or average cost of \$560.50 per annum. A little figuring will show the difference in the cost of the soldiers in the home and on pension roll; figures for last year's expenses at the home are \$30,413.30. As a money question, it will be much better to give the poor old soldiers or widows, a little more, so they may remain in touch with the dear ones a little while long-

Several widows were in attendance. All resolutions were adopted unanimously, and by a rising vote.

Chairman O. G. Thompson was instructed to forward a copy of all proceedings to the Laurens delegation in the General Assembly, with respectful request that these resolutions receive favorable action.
