Funeral services for John H. Rudd, prominent citizen of Cross Hill, who died at the Greenwood hospital, Friday night, Jan. 11, of pneumonia, were conducted at his home Sunday afternoon by Rev. R. H. McKinnon and interment was made in Liberty Springs cemetery. Mr. Rudd was a member of the Baptist church of Cross Hill.

Mr. Rudd was the son of the late T. A. and Eliza Goodwin Rudd. He was born January 13, 1868, in Cross Hill and was married to Miss Hattie Rushton, daughter of Dr. J. M. and Martha Herring Rushton of Johnston, in 1899. She died two years later.

Mr. Rudd is survived by one daughter, Miss Floride Rudd, and two sisters, Miss Annie Rudd and Miss Lillie Mae Rudd of Cross Hill. He was a popular citizen and there is general sorrow over his passing.
