There can be no doubt of the value and treatment of epidemic diseases. By the intelligent use of this method. much suffering can be avoided, and many conditions alleviated. Medical science has now practically abolished typhoid fever, malaria, small-pox, yellow fever, and other infectious diseases-and, has shorn diphtheria and scarlet fever, tetanus, hydrophobia,

In an epidemic of influenza, I once gave prophylactic vaccines to twentyfive patients. Twenty-three of them passed through the scourge without contracting dease, although several of them lived in infected families. The other two fared not so well; one of them had the "flu" when he took the first injection, the other, a tubercular,
