### SHARON OBJECTS TO CURIOSITY

Town Passes Ordinance Taxing Admission Charges To Stop Viewers of King "Mystery House."  
York, Feb. 26.—Objecting to the making of the home of Rafe King at Sharon a show place for curiosity seekers, the Sharon town council is endeavoring to impose on C. E. McGurkin, now in possession of the house, a license charge of \$200 a year. The object of this move, it is said, is not to obtain money for the town treasury but to end a spectacle displeasing to Sharon people, the swarming there all day Sunday of curiosity seekers from the four points of the compass. Sharon folks dislike this commercialization step.  
The ordinance under which McGurkin has been asked to pay a license specifies that "exhibits, theatrical or show" shall be licensed at the rate of \$2 to \$25 a day, the charge being in the discretion of the mayor.  
McGurkin does not think that the charging of admission to the King house comes within the province of this ordinance and is contemplating the question in the courts.  
The charge for entering the King home is 25 cents a piece. "Stay as long as you want" visitors are told. Visitors are few during the week, but on Sunday they stream there from morning till night.  
Not all of them, however, pay the admission charge. The economical ones sit in their cars and view things from afar.

# Hints for the Home

In the tiny hallway the corner cupboard with open upper shelves or shelves closed in by glass or mirror doors often proves a most convenient and decorative piece.

In the space below, which is masked by solid wooden doors, there will be room for umbrellas, rubbers and kindred unsightly articles. The upper space can be used for more decorative things—bright bits of pottery; a few curios; a gay little box to hold keys and matches to be caught up at the last moment. Or, if the upper doors be mirrored, the shelves can be used as a repository for the hat and gloves belonging to man of the house.

**Vegetarian Menu**  
Cream of lima bean soup  
Eggs and asparagus tips  
Stuffed baked tomatoes  
String bean salad

**Warm Slaw**  
A medium-sized head of cabbage, 2 eggs, 1 cup sour cream, 1½ table-spoons butter, ½ cup vinegar, ½ cup sugar, 1 tablespoon mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper. Chop cabbage fine, cook dressing until thick, then pour over cabbage while hot. Serve soon after.

**Ham Croquettes**  
To ¼ cup milk at boiling point add 2 table spoons bread crumbs; stir until thickened. Add 1 cup chopped cooked ham, 1 table spoon chopped parsley, seasoning and beaten yolk of 1 egg. Mix well and when cool form into balls the size of a nut. Roll in egg and crumbs and fry in hot fat 2 minutes or until brown.

**Carrott Pudding**  
Grate two cups of carrots; beat two eggs until light, then add the carrots, a table spoon of butter, seasoning, ¼ cup of milk and a teaspoon of flour. Mix well, pour into individual buttered baking cups and bake in a slow oven until firm.

**Bean and Beet Salad**  
To one cup cooked or canned lima beans add 1 cup chopped pickled beets and two chopped hard-cooked eggs. Mix the mayonnaise and serve at once on crisp shredded lettuce; garnish with mayonnaise.

**An Ironing Hint**  
Iron pillow cases lengthwise instead of crosswise and you will iron the wrinkles out instead of in.  
Starch will not stick to the iron if you add a little borax or paraffin to the starch when boiling.

### Duke Data Shows Industry Growth

Charlotte, Feb. 25.—An average of one new industry approximately every three days located in cities and towns in the Piedmont section of the Carolinas, served by the Duke interests, an industrial survey of the section made public today by the Duke Power company shows:  
A total of 117 new industrial plants were listed.  
An analysis of the survey shows that of the 117, a total of 93 were new industries established by new concerns and 24 were new plants or additions built by existing industrial establishments.  
Charlotte led with 16 new industries and Burlington was second with 15. Greensboro and Spartanburg had 11 each; High Point and Winston-Salem, nine each; Greenville eight; Hickory, Salisbury and Mt. Airy, six each, and Belmont five. Hendersonville, Reidsville, Thomasville, Elkin, Marion and Anderson each had two or more.

### Government Post Is Taken By Lindy

Washington, Feb. 23.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has accepted his first official post with the government—technical advisor to the aeronautics branch of the commerce department.  
Secretary Whiting announced the appointment Thursday and said that Col. Lindbergh had agreed to hold himself in readiness to respond to any call from William P. McCracken, Jr., the department's assistant secretary in charge of the aeronautics to advise or personally assist the government in all phases of its regulation of civil aviation, the establishment of airports and airways, research and prevention of accidents.
