

COUNTY TREASURER'S NOTICE 1928

The books of the County Treasurer will be open for the collection of taxes for the fiscal year, 1928, at the Treasurer's office from October 15th to December 31, 1928.

All persons owning property in more than one township are requested to call for receipts in each of the several townships in which the property is located.

Proper attention will be given those who wish to pay their taxes through the mail by check, money order, etc., giving name of township and number of school district.

CURTIS ASSUMES SECOND PLACE

Kansas Sworn In As Vice-President. Will Not Attempt To Change Rules of the Senate.

Washington, March 4. — Charles Curtis took over the vice-presidency today from Charles Dawes at a ceremony unique for its good-natured clash of pronouncements by the two leading participants.

The nation's officialdom gathered in the senate chamber shattered the solemnity of the hour by jovial applause when Dawes reiterated his antagonism to the senate's liberal rules, and Curtis, a moment later in his inaugural address, defended them.

In more moderate manner than four years ago upon his own ascending into office, Dawes again criticized the unlimited debate allowed by the senate. And the senate, which has totally ignored his plea, good naturedly applauded as the former army general emphatically said, "I take back nothing."

The interest of the audience intensified as Mr. Curtis began his address a moment later. Again applause and laughter rang through the assemblage facing Herbert Hoover and Calvin Coolidge as Curtis, 34 years a legislator and the father of the controverted rules, paused and in measured words declared:

"The vice-president is not one of the makers of the law, nor is he consulted about the rules adopted to govern your actions. His obligations to the people of the country to whom he owes his high position and his duty to you senators calls for a fair and impartial construction of the rules which you, yourselves, have adopted and which you alone may change."

Curtis looked very much at home as he took over the chair, in the chamber where he has served so long. He banged the gavel almost viciously as if by habit as he stepped into the vice-presidential harness and began in serious tone the reading of his brief address.

Sitting beside Coolidge and Hoover in front of the vice-presidential dais, Mr. Dawes smiled genially and crossed his legs as the chamber enjoyed the good natured admonishment administered to him by his successor.

The criticism of the world war general and business man was tempered today with the feeling of one about to depart from company he loved, and Mr. Dawes spoke first of that feeling.

"At the time of parting between friends," Mr. Dawes said, "there is no place for acrimony and I assure you there is none in my heart. But I could not be true to myself and to my conception of the duties of this position if, as I leave it for the last time, when, if ever, disinterestedness should characterize my convictions, I did not speak again of the collective error of this great and powerful branch of the government."

"Alone of all the deliberative bodies of the world, the senate of the United States, under its rules, has parted with the power to allot its time to the consideration of the subject before it in accordance with their relative importance. This defect of procedure is fundamental. I take back nothing."

SIX-DAY TRIP FOR GLEE CLUB

Organization Is Ready After Preparation Under Direction of Rev. M. C. Dendy of Newberry.

The Presbyterian College glee club will leave Clinton on Monday, March 11th, for a six-day trip. The itinerary includes six programs to be given on successive nights at towns in the upper part of the state. A separate trip, probably of three days duration, will be made later in the month to towns in the lower-state districts.

Present plans are that the club will leave the campus Monday morning, March 11th, and motor by bus direct to Piedmont where the opening performance is scheduled for that night. Tuesday evening will find the songsters in Pelzer, and Wednesday evening they will perform in Anderson. Westminster is to be the scene of Thursday night's program, and Clover that of the program for Friday night. Of course no glee club trip would be complete without a performance at Chicora, so that is where the boys will sojourn before the footlights on Saturday evening. They plan to be home again late Saturday night, after a complete week's absence from college work.

Under the direction of Marshall Dendy, a P. C. graduate and now a Presbyterian minister at Newberry, the club has been quickly taking shape. Constant and faithful work has made it possible to bring the work of the group to a high spot in a very short while. With the finishing touches which the work this week will bring, the P. C. glee club will be fully prepared to make its debut for 1929.

It is felt that the club has been especially fortunate in the selections chosen for the program. From past experience, always a hard taskmaster, the men on the club have learned pretty well just what songs and features "go over" well to the representative audience. Benefitting from the lessons learned in the past, those in charge have picked songs that have plenty of interest and snap. There will be no numbers that drag.

A few of the interesting and unique features are a vocal solo, a violin solo, a marimba duet, a violin-marimbapiano trio, and a snappy quartet that promises to get real low-down. In addition, there will be the usual variety that is obtained by making the program a combination of glee club and orchestra presentations. It is learned also that two or three of the members of the club are working on a short skit which will fit in well with the rest of the menu. If all of those dreams come true, the performances of the Presbyterian college will be well up to the standard that has been set in previous years.

C. M. T. C. Enrollment Still Going Forward

Lieut. A. N. Taylor, sub-district chief for the Citizens Training camps says that he will continue to receive applications to attend next summer's camps until notice is received from the district chief of the state that further enrollment be discontinued.

Lieut. Taylor reports that a large number of applications have gone forward from his office and that A. C. Todd, the Laurens county C. M. T. C. representative has also sent forward many. The nation-wide support and the ever-increasing popularity of these camps speaks for their success as a national institution.

Lieut. Taylor urges all the Clinton boys who have sent in their application blanks to be prompt in completing their vaccinations and anti-typhoid inoculations as it must be remembered that no applicant is placed on the final appointment list until these have been completed and the doctor's evidence of the fact has been sent forward. Dr. J. W. Davis and Dr. T. J. Peake of this city, and also Dr. Mills of Cross Hill, have volunteered their services and are giving the physical examinations, anti-typhoid inoculations, and vaccinations (see C. M. T. C. pamphlet on small pox serum) without charge to the Laurens county boys.
