WHAT DO P. S. JEANES' DO?

Chicken With Vegetables  
Cut meat of a roasting chicken in pieces and put a layer in casserole; sprinkle with four and seasoning and a little water. Add a layer of diced assorted vegetables, seasoning and butter; repeat, cover the dish and cook for 1-2 hours in moderate oven. Then pour over the whole a cup of cream and cook ten minutes more.

Apricot Fritters  
For a tempting breakfast special—beat together 3 eggs, 1-2 cup milk, 1

tablespoon sugar; add dry ingredients sifted together—1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1-4 teaspoon of salt. Chop one cup drained canned apricots and add to the batter, beating well. Drop from spoon into deep hot fat and fry light brown. Drain and serve with maple syrup.

When Baking a Ham  
Instead of basting roast or baked ham with its own juice, use the juice from a can of pineapple. It gives ham a delicious flavor.
