Hints for the Home

As a variation for pictures or mirrors a very attractive bit of decoration for the bare wall space may be furnished by a wall scone used to hold flowers or trailing ivy.

In a Spanish or Italian room the wrought iron scone is effective; likewise the colorful pottery scone typical of the period. In 18th century rooms the wall pocket of painted tin or quaint old porcelain is most appropriate, while for modernistic rooms there are many delightful new designs in opaque or colored glass, metals or pottery.

These wall decorations are especially appropriate for the season which is just at hand.

For the unlovely interior of one's dresser the shops offer fascinating pads of plain or figured silk in harmony with the color scheme of the bedroom. Or we may make these accessories at home at very little cost.

The silk should be cut the exact size of the bottom of the dresser drawers, allowing for seams of course. Line the pads with a layer of cotton sprinkled with sachet, stitch the edges together, and quilt the pad in a simple design with silk thread of contrasting color.

Tripe Lyonnaise

Clean and scaled one pound tripe and cut in small pieces; chop one large onion fine, brown tripe and onion with 2 tablespoons butter until good color. Add 1 tablespoon vinegar, salt and pepper to taste; simmer 2 minutes longer and serve with 1 tablespoon chopped parsley sprinkled over.

Asparagus Milanaise

Use either fresh or canned asparagus. Drain the stalks which have been cooked until tender, arrange in baking dish, cover with rich cream sauce, sprinkle grated parmesan cheese thickly over the top and brown in a quick oven.

Tiger Lily Salad

Arrange peeled sections of grapefruit in flower form on salad plate, striping each with a thin line of pimento. Make centers of halved maraschino cherries filled with chopped nuts; add spears of French endive to suggest leaf and stem. Serve mayonnaise in separate bowl.

Old-Time Brown Sugar Pie

1 cup brown sugar, 1-4 cup butter, 1-2 cup cream, 2 eggs. Beat yolks lightly, add sugar, then cream and vanilla flavoring. Then add the melted butter. Beat whites of eggs to stiff froth, fold in, pour mixture into pastry shell and bake well.

WOMEN HOLD ANNUAL MEET

Twenty-Fifth Session of County Baptist W. M. U. Held With Friendship Church.

Laurens, April 14.—The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Woman's Missionary union of the Laurens Baptist association was held Wednesday with Friendship church, near Gray Court, with an unusually large attendance of delegates and visitors interested in the work of the union. The day's program included devotional exercises, reports from the various local unions, and the discussion of vital subjects by leading members of the county organization.

One of the pleasing features of the meeting, which had not been put in the regular program, was the admirable address before the body by Miss Neale Young, missionary worker now at home from Africa. Miss Young is from Florence and has been spending her furlough in the state, making addresses at different gatherings of mission workers. She spoke before the W. M. S. of the First Baptist church
