"The difficulties of agriculture can not be cured in a day; they can not all be cured by legislation; they can not be cured by the federal government alone. But farmers and their organizations can be assisted to overcome these inequalities.

"Every effort of this character is an experiment, and we shall find from our experience the way to further advance. We must make a start.

"With the creation of a great instrumentality of this character, of a strength and importance equal to that of those which we have created for transportation and banking, we give immediate assurance of the determined purpose of the government to meet the difficulties of which we are now aware, and to create an agency through which constructive action for the future will be assured."

EIGHT CONVICTS ESCAPE PRISON

Overpower Guard at Abbeville Gang and Get Away. Two Whites and Six Negroes.

Abbeville, April 14.—Wrestling a gun and pistol from the guard, Jimmie Dawson, eight convicts, two white and six Negroes, escaped from the Abbeville county chaingang in the Antreville section Saturday afternoon about 3 o'clock. Mr. Dawson, the only guard on duty at the time over 15 prisoners on a country road, was caught unawares by the eight who escaped, but he made a brave effort to keep possession of his pistol after they had taken his rifle from him. He scuffled with several and fired one shot before the convicts finally jerked the pistol from his hand, but the bullet went wild.

After getting both weapons Carl Haddon, said to be a bad Negro, held the pistol on Mr. Dawson, while another cut the chains holding the cuff

links of the shackles from their legs and then the eight made their escape.

Mr. Dawson gave the alarm as soon as possible and a search began immediately under the direction of Sheriff McLane, but the trail soon was lost. They were traced a short distance by impressions left on the ground by the dragging chains.

Seven other prisoners made no attempt to escape, and, so far as known, did not try to render aid to Mr. Dawson. Some of them told the sheriff that they were frightened when the guard fired his pistol and were afraid they might be killed.

The sheriff said a rope was found where the convicts had been working and he believed that the convicts first plotted to catch Mr. Dawson and tie him, but when he fought back they did not use the rope.

Willie Roebuck, serving a life sentence for murder, is believed to have been the ring leader in the plot to escape, in the opinion of the sheriff.

The fugitives are:

Adger Manning and Fred Edenton, white youths, serving 12 months for housebreaking and larceny, and Willie Roebuck, life term for murder, on the gang five years; Henry Allen, 15 years for manslaughter, served four years; Will Revenue, 15 years for manslaughter, served three months; John Jackson, two years for house breaking and larceny; Jesse McClinton, two years for house breaking and larceny, and Carlton Haddon, four months for house breaking and larceny.

McGraw Is Held After Inquest

Columbia, April 15.—Policeman A. B. McGraw, of New Brookland, was indicted today by a Richland county grand jury of the murder of Henry Martin in the emergency room of a hospital here Monday night of last week. Following the arraignment of McGraw Solicitor A. F. Spigner set the trial for Thursday morning.

Opinion about the court house tonight indicated that Attorney Broome, who was absent today, would move for continuance of the case until the summer term. Solicitor Spigner expressed the belief that a motion for a change of venue would be made.

McGraw was indicted by the grand jury minus the service of its foreman, H. H. McGill, superintendent of the Columbia hospital, where McGraw is alleged to have fired twice into Martin's stomach and inflicted fatal wounds. Mr. McGill disqualified himself and appointed J. D. Mott of Columbia, to serve as foreman for the McGraw case.

HOOVER URGES FARM BOARD

"The pledged purpose of such a federal farm board is the reorganization of the marketing system on sounder and more stable and more economic lines. To do this the board will require funds to assist in creating and sustaining farmer-owned and farmer-controlled agencies for a variety of purposes, such as the acquisition of adequate working capital to be advanced against commodities lodged for storage; necessary and prudent advances to corporations created and owned by farmers' marketing organizations for the purchase and orderly marketing of surpluses occasioned by climatic variations or by harvest congestion; to authorize the creation and support of clearing houses, especially for perishable products, through which under producers' approval, cooperation can be established with distributors and processors to more orderly marketing of commodities of many wastes in distribution; and to provide for licensing of handlers of some perishable products so as to eliminate unfair practices.

"Every penny of waste between farmer and consumer that we can eliminate, whether it arises from methods of distribution or from haz-

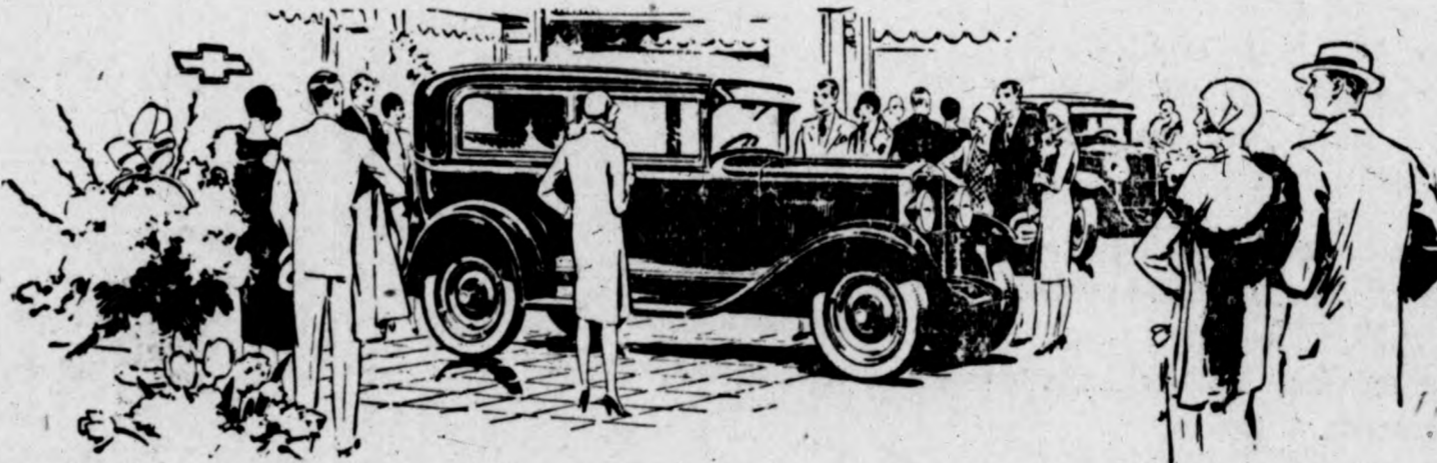
