

Cotton Situation I believe that one-third of the cotton of Laurens county is planted, and since the storm, or the excessive amount of rain last week, it may be necessary to replant one-half of the cotton over in this county. However, we have plenty of time yet to produce a cotton crop. There is quite a bit of demand for planting seed in the lower part of the state, due to the recent FOR SALE-Five nice fox terrier storm destroying the cotton crop. Quite a bit of cotton seed are being sold that should not be sold at the prices they are obtaining. A person should figure on a reasonable profit and not have in mind too great a

profit on cotton seed. I would suggest that those planting the High School graducotton leave their rows not over 36 inches, and upon chopping the cotton dew; in fact, no substitute compares leave 1, 2, and 3 stalks every hoe's width. I would suggest using a top dressing of nitrate of soda, or sulphate of ammonia, or any other quickly available ammonia at the rate of 100 pounds to the acre. Last year top dressing gave excellent results. Katherine Langston, 4-H club member of Barksdale, used 200 pounds of nitrate on her club acre. producing 405 pounds of lint cotton. On the check plot she produced 188 pounds of lint per acre. Gray Nelson, club boy of Hickory Tavern, produced 510 pounds of lint where top dressing was used at the rate of 200 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre, against 270 pounds where no top dressing was used. Harold Brown, club member, produced 428 pounds of lint by the use of 200 pounds of nitrate of soda as compared with 256 pounds per acre where no top dressing was used. This top dressing should be used at the time of chop-
