**COUNCIL HOLDS  
JUNE MEETING**

Routine Matters Given Attention. Public Abattoir Now Being Considered for City.

City council held its regular monthly meeting Monday night with Mayor Young and all six aldermen present. Routine business was before the meeting for action and several matters under the head of new business discussed but no action taken.

The report of the police department and recorder's office for the month totaled \$768.00 levied and collected in fines, with 90 chain gang days passed on to offenders. Council voted to purchase light summer caps for the members of the force.

Council approved the placing of liability and accident insurance on the police department car and the water and light truck.

The need of additional work at Rosemont cemetery was before council. It was authorized that the cleaning and beautifying program be begun at once and the cemetery committee instructed to plan for the permanent up-keep of the property.

Several petitions were before council asking for street improvements. In view of heavy financial obligations during the summer, action on the requests was postponed until a later date.

The matter of providing an abattoir for the city was generally discussed. Members of council have recently inspected several plants in nearby cities and data is now being assembled relative to the installation of a similar plant here for the inspection and slaughtering of all meats offered for sale in the city.

Several other matters of minor importance were acted upon, all bills payable approved, after which the meeting adjourned.

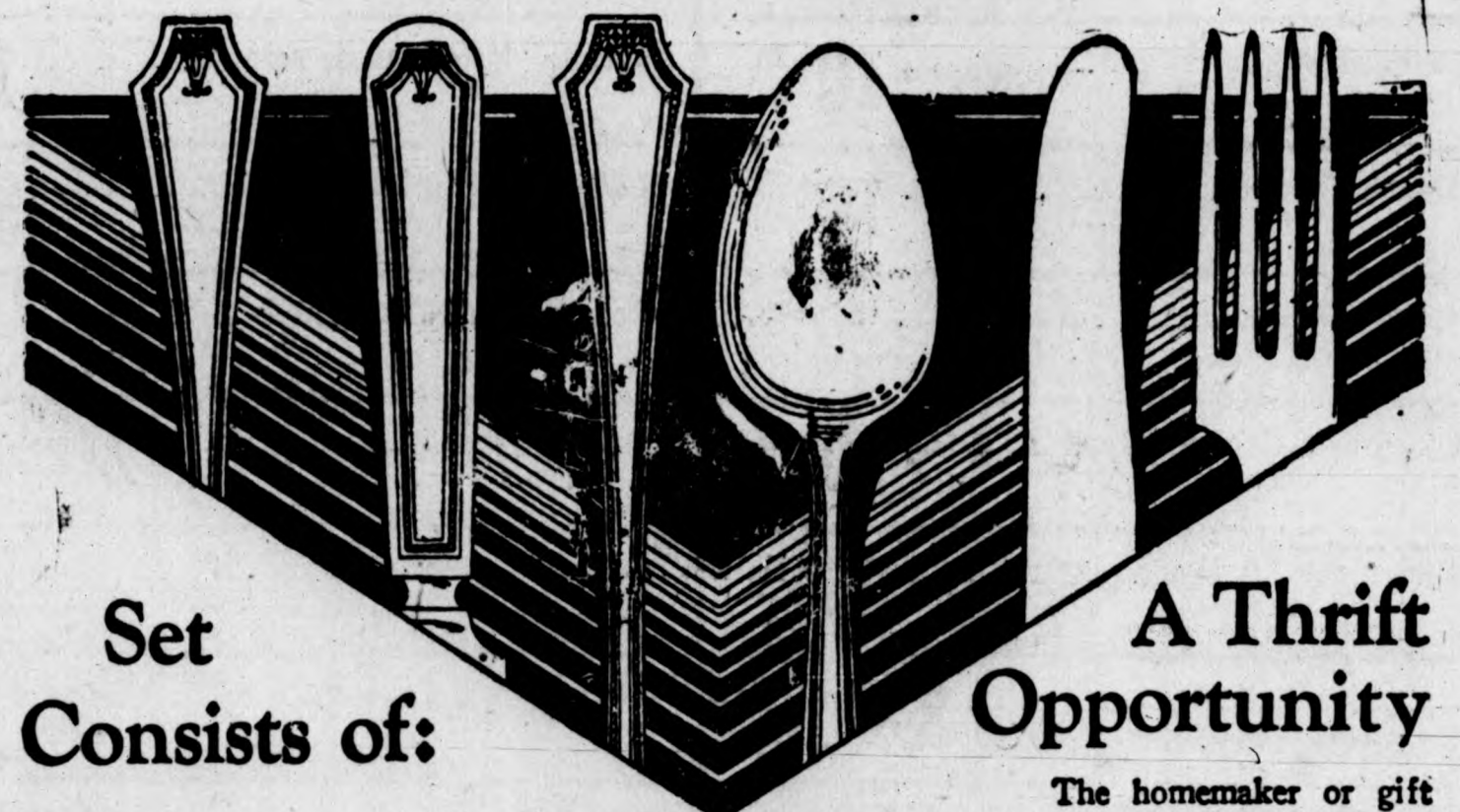
