Virginia Soup

Peel two sweet potatoes, add to the beans and boil until soft; rub through a strainer, season with salt and pepper and serve very hot.

Browns Flour Quickly

For thickening meat gravies, browned flour is usually best. To prepare a quantity which can be used from time to time, spread one cup flour on a pie tin and set in hot oven. Stir frequently to prevent burning.

Removes Color From Fabrics

CHAMBER HOLDS OCT. MEETING

Reports Heard and Resolutions Adopted Seeking Improvement of Route 56 and Calhoun Highway.

The October meeting of the Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday evening in the club rooms at which time several matters were up for consideration.

Four Presbyterian college students, Messrs. Barron, Dendy, Ferguson and Wylie, who have undertaken to assist in the local Boy Scout movement now being organized, were guests of the club and spoke enthusiastically of the work that is to be undertaken.

The death of one of the club's most faithful members, J. I. Copeland, was called to the members' attention by the president and a committee consisting of W. W. Harris, H. D. Henry and J. F. Jacobs, Sr., appointed to draw up suitable resolutions on his passing.

A partial report from the contemplated Associated Charities organization was heard and discussed. The entire matter was left in the hands of the Moral Welfare committee to be worked out and properly presented to the community.

The need of additional members for the club, both active and associate, was pointed out and the president announced that such a drive will soon be launched through the membership committee.

It was also announced that "Ladies Night" would be held on the second Tuesday evening of November and that a program of interest will be arranged for the occasion.

J. F. Jacobs, Sr., called three matters to the club's attention, the question of endorsing the petitions now being circulated for the hard surfacing of Highway No. 56, Clinton to the Spartanburg county line. It was pointed out that a surplus of approximately \$80,000 remains on the Kinard link of Highway No. 2, and the president was authorized to notify each member of the county delegation of the action taken and ask that the petitions be favorably acted upon.

Mr. Jacobs further spoke of the \$65,000.00 bond issue decision soon to be given, and offered a resolution inviting all commercial organizations in the respective towns on the Calhoun highway, to urge upon the state highway department the importance of giving first consideration to the hard surfacing of the Calhoun highway from Calhoun Falls to Cheraw. It was suggested, and agreed, that the respective delegations be urged to go before the highway department and push this highway as one of the first projects to be undertaken if the bond issue is upheld by the supreme court.

Mr. Jacobs further spoke of the action of the county delegation in taking over the ownership of the Laurens library and pledging \$1500 annually toward its maintenance. He stated that Clinton's library operated by the Woman's club needs enlarging likewise and offered a resolution calling upon the county delegation to provide a similar sum for the organization here and provide rules and regulations deemed wise for its future maintenance. The resolutions offered by Mr. Jacobs touching upon the two road projects and the appeal for county library aid, were unanimously adopted.

CONGRESS HEARS PRIME MINISTER

British Diplomat Declares War Between United States and Britain Impossible If Both Keep Pact.

Washington, Oct. 7.—Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald interrupted his conferences with President Hoover today to tell the congress of the United States that there could be no war between the two great English-speaking nations if each did its duty in making effective the Kellogg-Briand treaty renouncing war.

"There can be no war," the British statesman said. "Nay, more; it is absolutely impossible, if you and we do our duty in making the peace pact effective, that any section of our arms, whether land, or sea, or air, can never again come into hostile conflict."

The senate chamber was crowded with legislators, diplomats and citizen spectators.

Asserting amid applause that the problems of jealousy and of fear have disappeared, the prime minister declared the American and British governments have met together and have said: "What is all this bother about parity?"

"Parity?" he questioned sharply. "Take it!" he exclaimed, "—without reserve, heaped up and flowing over. That is one of the results of this visit. Another result of the visit is that we have come to understand each other."

"Ah, senators!" the prime minister continued, "as long as you conduct your negotiations by correspondence over thousands of miles of sea, you will never understand each other at all. In these democratic days, when heart speaks to heart as deep speaks to deep and silence talks to silence, personality, personal contact, exchange of views by the lip, sitting at two sides of a fireplace, as it was my great privilege to do this week-end with your president, these things are to be as important as anything else in laying the foundation of an enduring peace all over the world."

Before the visiting statesman spoke

to congress, he and President Hoover joined in a statement that gratifying progress had been made in their exchange of views and that the conversations in the mountains of Virginia last Saturday were continuing.

"We have frankly reviewed all questions which might give rise to friction between our peoples," the statement said. "Gratifying progress has been made and the conversations are continuing."

This brief pronouncement was made immediately after the return of the president and his guests from the Hoover camp on the Rapidan river.

The first British prime minister to address the American congress, Mr. MacDonald was accorded a cordial reception in both houses.

After a brief address the prime minister stepped down and received the members.

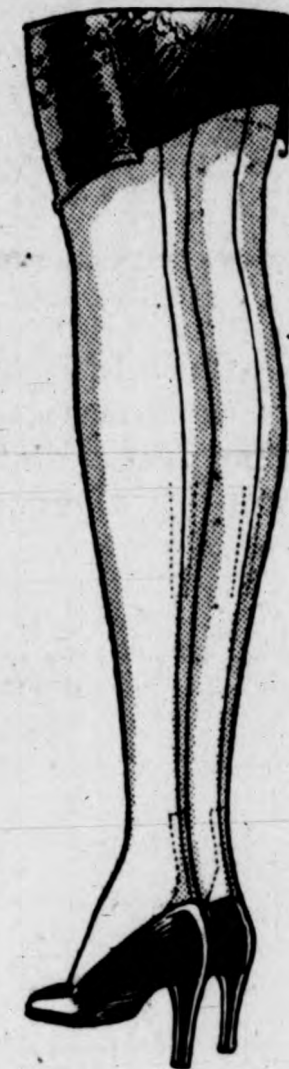
