The dress illustrated is of transparent velvet, and presents the new high waistline, slenderizing mode. The new features are the flare skirt, the uneven hem and the fitted hip. The dip on the skirt is a distinguishing feature also: This "new silhouette" is bound for great popularity.

The tailored suit, for which the ensemble has never become quite a substitute, is popular this autumn. The overblouse is the significant detail in some new fashions. It is emphasized by the use of splendid fabrics, with beautiful needlework and interesting designs. They play into the ensemble effect by matching the coat lining.

No less than 270 shades have been chosen by manufacturers of gloves for this season's output. AERIAL WARFARE IS LOOKED FOR IN P. C.-ERSKINE TILT

Reid and Parkinson Will Be Opposed By Green and 'Skeet' Galloway In Friday's Grid Encounter.

Anderson, Nov. 4.—When the Erskine Seceders and Presbyterian Blue Stockings go together at Memorial field on Friday, as the feature athletic event of the Anderson agricultural fair, two of the fastest football teams in the state will be fighting for supremacy in the "second division" of the Palmetto race.

Constructed along the same lines, the two outfits are expected to put on one of the greatest exhibitions of aerial warfare seen on the South Carolina gridiron this season.

Reid and Parkinson, the great duo of the Seceders, will be pitted against Green and Galloway, two fast and flashy backs of the Presbyterian college outfit. And in the contest among the wingmen there will be Hambright, one of the most brilliant ends in the state, against Lynn, of Presbyterian, who has shown great form this season in the wing position.

While both teams are equipped with a great running attack, it is indicated that the aerial game will be brought to the fore in this contest, this form of warfare being the chief weapon of both teams. However, Presbyterian college is going to depend to a large extent on the speed of Jimmy Green, who has demonstrated this season that he is one of the greatest running backs in the state, and who is expected to make a bid for all-state honors this year.

Jake Todd has a great running back in Parkinson, who with Reid and Petty was a member of the state championship freshman team of a few years ago when the Erskine frosh humbled the Clemson college cubs in a Thanksgiving day game at Memorial athletic field by a score of 7 to 6.

The contest here on Friday will be the last state game for three of Erskine's stars, Reid, Parkinson and Hambright. It will be the final opportunity for many fans to see this great three-some in action.

KILLS SELF AS BRIDE LOOKS ON

Wiley Weathers of Youngs Township, Takes Life With Shotgun. No Reason Given.

Laurens, Nov. 4.—As his bride of two months and two of his sisters helplessly looked on from a distance of a few hundred feet Wiley R. Weathers, young farmer of near Central school house, Youngs township, early today suicided by shooting himself in the head with a shot gun.

Coroner John A. Thomason held the inquest and according to investigation by other officers and the testimony given before the jury it seems that Weathers had started out squirrel hunting with a friend by the name of Cox. After going a short distance Weathers told Cox he was going to kill himself. Cox got Weathers quieted and then hastened to the house to inform the family. Before the wife and sisters reached the scene they were horrified to witness the husband and brother practically decapitated as he knelt at the edge of the woods, placed the gun muzzle to his temple and fired.

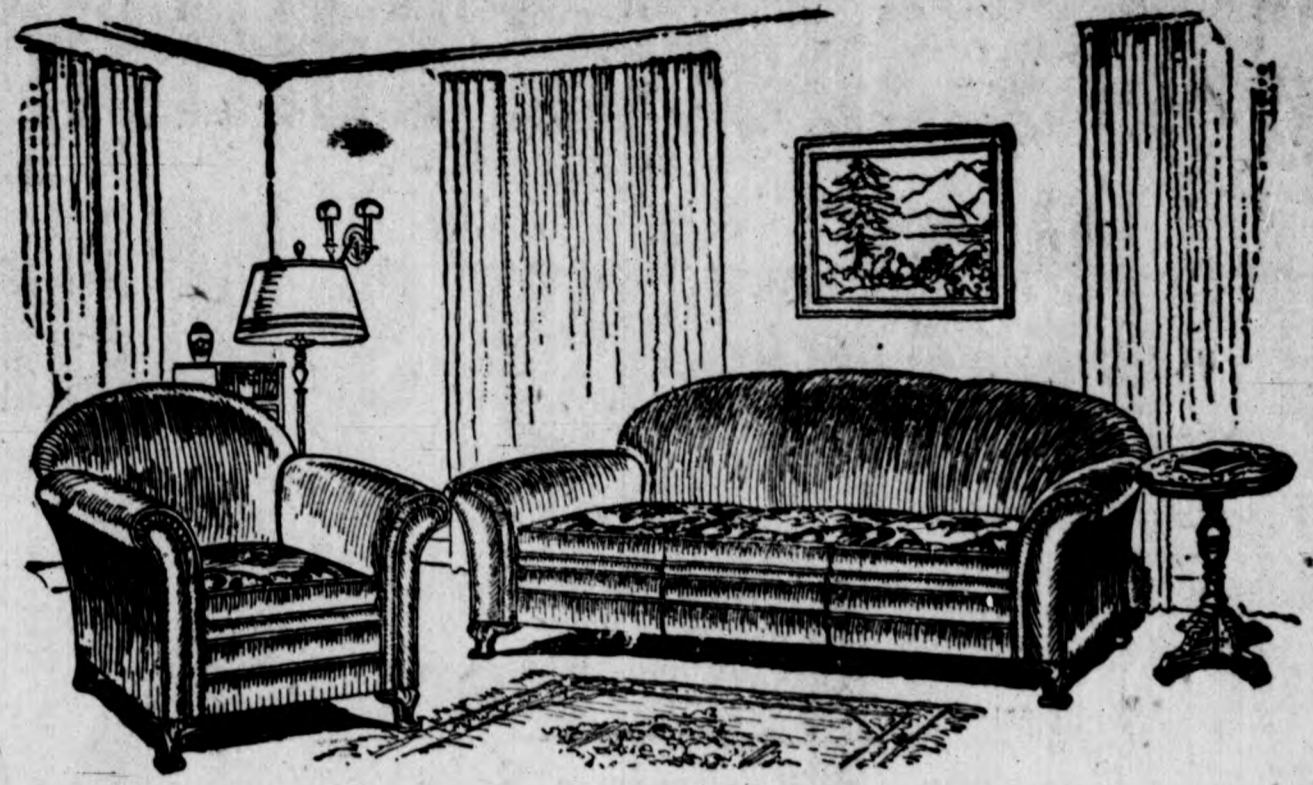
