

Historic Corday Dagger

Discovered in Berlin Berlin.-The historic dagger with

which Charlotte Corday stabbed Marat, one of the leaders of the French Revolution, has come to light again in Berlin, 135 years after it fulfilled its deadly mission.

It has been purchased by a German business man from M. Alexandre Andrevesky a well-known Russian immigrant in Berlin. The German business man is keeping his name secret since he wants to test the alleged fatal powers of the dagger.

Andrevesky got the dagger from Colonel Bobitsch, an officer once popular in the crack Guards of the Czar. but who was later dismissed from service without reason.

The colonel attributed his dismissal to the possession of the dagger, say. ing that members of his family who possessed the weapon for many generations have all been visited by mis fortune of one sort or another.

63 Raw Eggs Eaten to Save Railroad Rule

Eland, Wis.-Philip Szutkoski, rallroad employee, here, acted "according to Hoyle" by eating 63 raw eggs in 20 minutes to save them from spolling when they were found cracked and broken in shipment.
