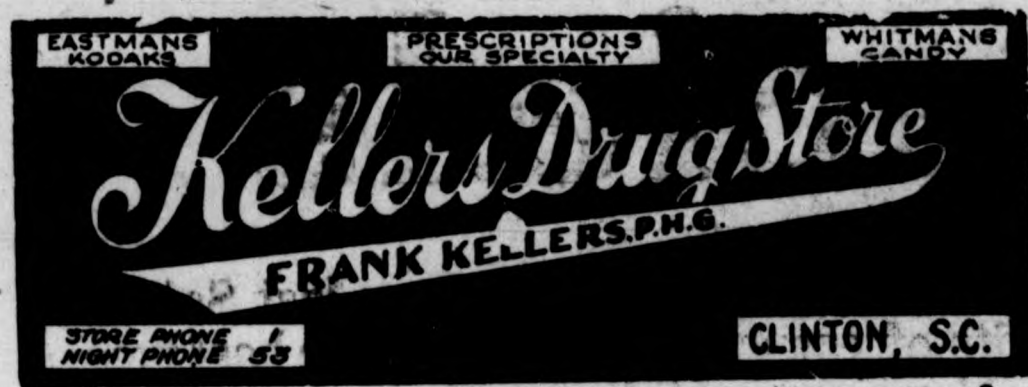

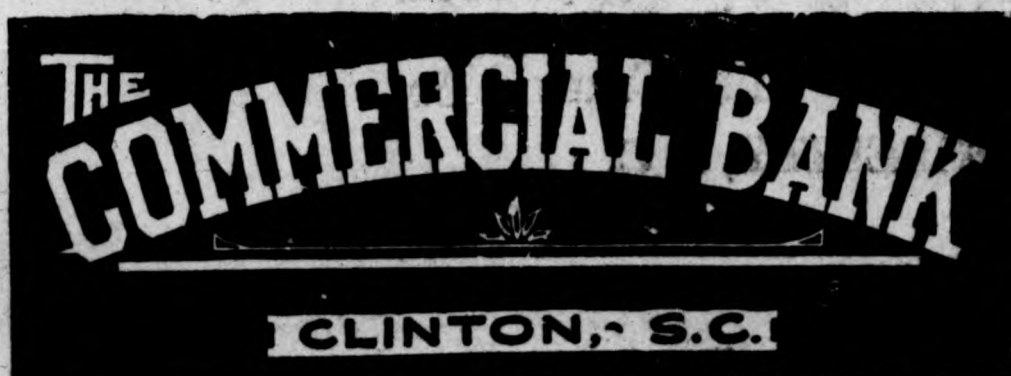

Historic Corday Dagger Discovered in Berlin

Berlin.—The historic dagger with which Charlotte Corday stabbed Marat, one of the leaders of the French Revolution, has come to light again in Berlin, 135 years after it fulfilled its deadly mission.

It has been purchased by a German business man from M. Alexandre Andrevesky a well-known Russian immigrant in Berlin. The German business man is keeping his name secret since he wants to test the alleged fatal powers of the dagger.

Andrevesky got the dagger from Colonel Bobitsch, an officer once popular in the crack Guards of the Czar, but who was later dismissed from service without reason.

The colonel attributed his dismissal to the possession of the dagger, saying that members of his family who possessed the weapon for many generations have all been visited by misfortune of one sort or another.

63 Raw Eggs Eaten to Save Railroad Rule

Ehnd, Wis.—Philip Szutkoski, railroad employee, here, acted "according to Hoyle" by eating 63 raw eggs in 20 minutes to save them from spoiling when they were found cracked and broken in shipment.

Szutkoski explained his act by stating that the railroad book of rules calls upon every employee to exert every influence to protect shipments handled by the carrier.

Has Pony 47 Years Old

Marysville, Kan.—An Indian pony believed to be forty-seven years old is owned by Michael Reuger, a farmer near here. The animal is said to have been one of a herd purchased in 1882 by Charles Phillips. Although it cannot chew corn or prairie hay, the pony still eats oats and alfalfa. It is used to drive cows to and from pastures.
