Home Demonstration Notes

Program of Work for the County

During the past week the county home agent met with five women's clubs. At each of these meetings a demonstration was given in exterior beautification. Since December, January, and February, are the months in which foundation plantings in shrubbery should be made, it is the proper time now to consider the location of these plants about the home.

If your home has not been planted with shrubbery, the county agent is ready to help you select and place these plants. It is necessary to study the home and its surroundings in order to plant these shrubs where they will give the most desirable effect.

Many of our native plants can be used at a very low cost to improve the lawns and yards in the county. If this is done we will find much more beauty and attractiveness manifested and in many cases we can obstruct the view of many unsightly objects.

In each of the communities where these demonstrations have been given, one or more members have already begun work on their yards.

In the 4-H clubs, four meetings have been held this week, all in health work. The girls were weighed and measured, then given health rules and food score cards to check their food habits.

All of this health work is to prepare the girls for the county-wide health contest to be held some time in February or March.

One other 4-H club has joined the ranks in the county, making a total of eight organized since September 1. The new club is at Youngs school, and has elected the following officers for the coming year:
