

Employment In December Falls

Washington, Jan. 3.—The Census Bureau reported today that the number of Americans with regular jobs dropped 962,000 in December. It said the fall was due to the slow-down in farm operations with the onset of winter.

Non-farm employment increased 143,000 to a total of 51,782,000. An increase in part-time holiday-season jobs offset declines in construction and other lines which always contract during the winter. Farm employment was down 1,105,000 leaving the net decline of 962,000 in jobholders.

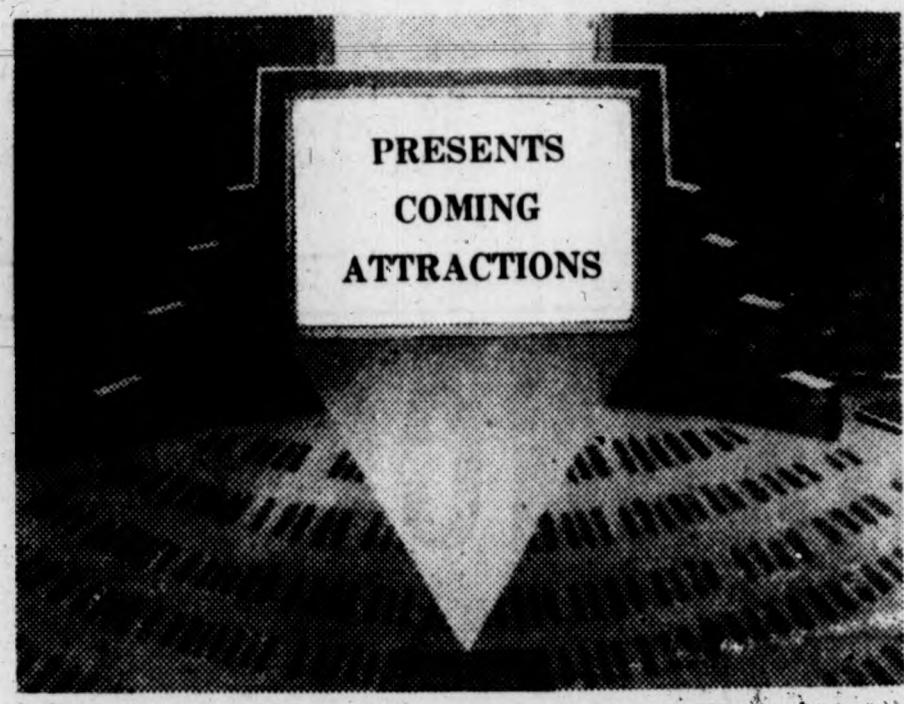
