The visitation committee for January is composed of Mrs. A. B. Stump, Mrs. Turner, and Mrs. E. N. Sullivan.

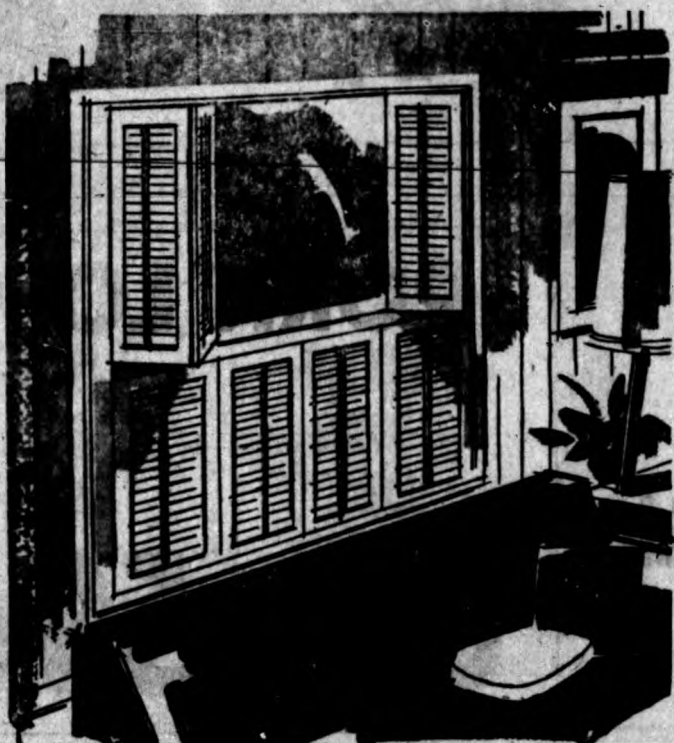
Announcement was made of the Feast of Lights service for 5:30 Sunday afternoon.

Four Legal Sales On January Salesday

Real estate and personal property sales in four legal cases were made in the Court House Monday morning, salesday for January. One was by Clerk of Court Walter E. Dunlap and the other three by Judge of Probate J. Hewlette Wasson.

The case handled by the clerk of court involved a store building with fixtures and merchandise and a three-acre tract of land on which the building is located about a mile on the Laurens side of Cothran Bridge over Lake Greenwood. The sale was made in settlement of the estate of the late A. R. Alexander and was bid in by W. H. Nicholson, attorney, for \$10,000.
