Anderson, who will retire, will be succeeded by Robert P. Wilder, assistant superintendent and principal of Clinton High School. The change will be effective at

the close of the fiscal year. Mr. Anderson resigned at a meeting of the board earlier in the week, and announcement was made Wednesday when Mr. Wilder indicated his acceptance of the position.

Anderson, a graduate of Presbyterian College, served for a number of years as principal of the high school, later going to Woodruff as superintendent for two years, and returning to Clinton as superintendent. When the county was divided into two school districts, rather than about a dozen, he was made superintendent of what is roughly the lower half of the county. comprising a school system centered around Clinton High School.

Mr. Wilder is a graduate of Furman University, and served first as coach and teacher at the high school. He has served as at principal for many years and two on years ago was made assistant superintendent of the school district as well.
