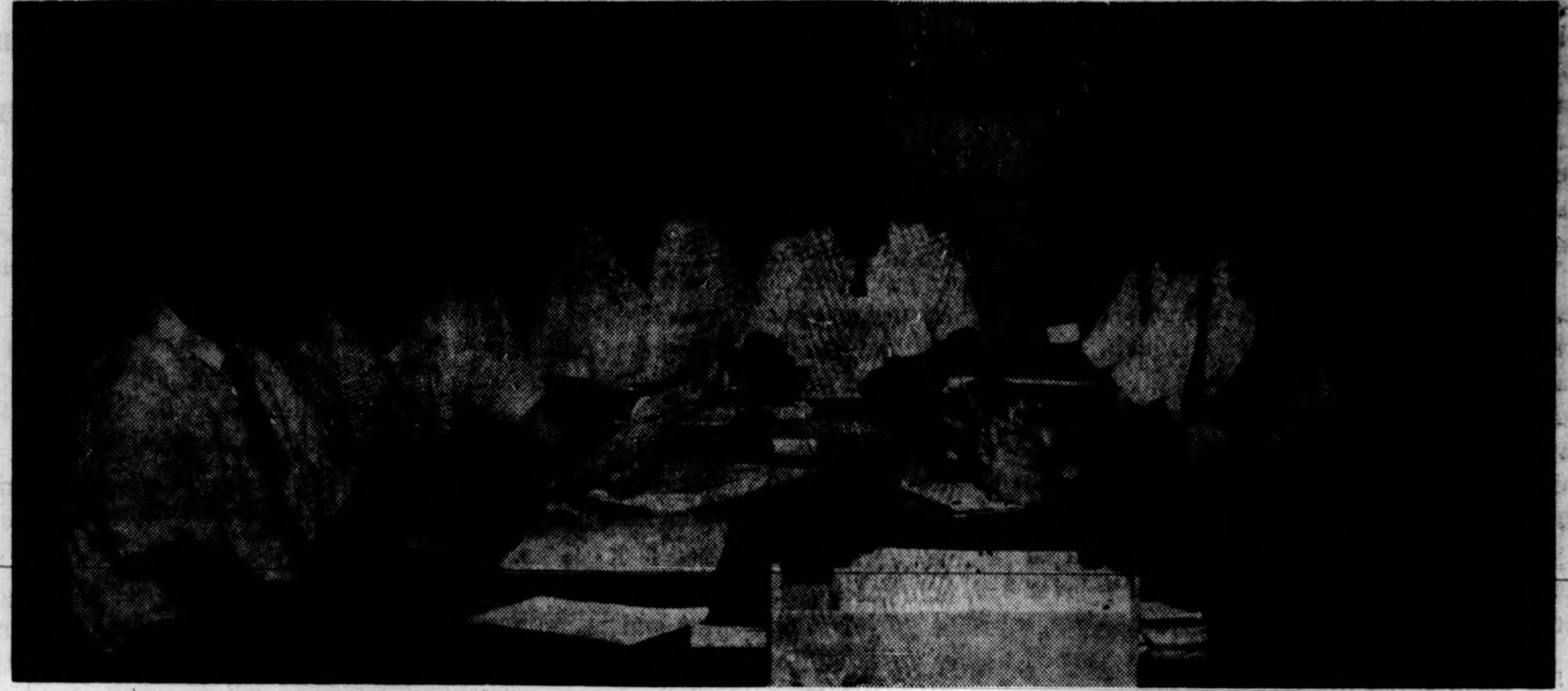
Duplicate Voting Certificates May Be Secured Today

County Campaign Slated To Start Monday Night

Laurens County' Democratic political campaign will officially get underway Monday night when 13 candidates for four county offices will present their claims for suffrage of the voters in the first of eight scheduled meetings.

The candidates will be heard at the Hickory Tavern precinct, in the upper part of the county, with the meeting beginning at 8 o'clock.

Firing the opening guns will be three candidates for the State Senate, four for the House of Representatives, three for Sheriff, and three for County Commissioner.

Two unopposed candidates for reelection, Walter E. Dunlap, clerk of court, and Marshall Pressley, coroner, probably will make short statements.

Candidates for Magistrate will speak only when meetings are held in their townships.

Congressional candidates for the Fourth S. C. District will appear on the county ballots and they will be heard if they appear at the meetings. Congressman Robert T. Ashmore is opposed by Gordon E. Weathers.

PC Professors Publish Article

An article by two members of the Presbyterian College chemistry department appears in the most recent issue of "The Analyzer," quarterly journal of Beckman Instruments, Inc.

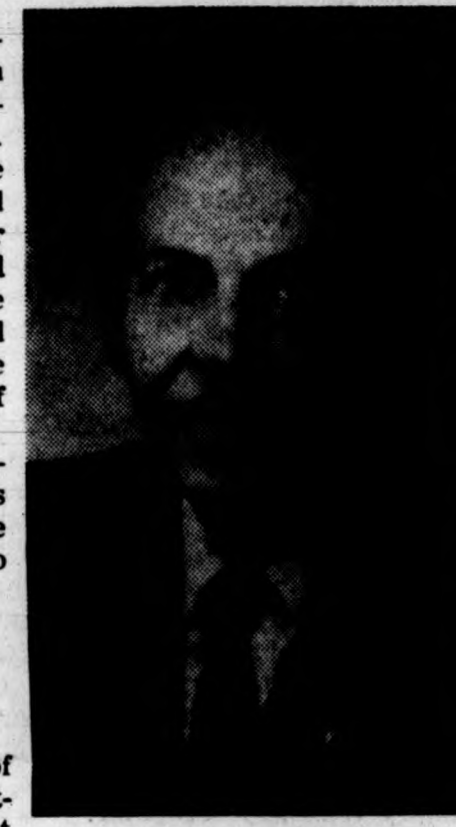

Democrats of Clinton will go to the polls Tuesday to nominate candidates for mayor and six members of city council.

Mayor J. J. Cornwall, running for reelection, is opposed by B. Noland Suddeth, a former member of city council. Suddeth qualified as a candidate just before the books closed Saturday at noon.

Two aldermanic candidates, presently members of council, are unopposed. They are Lynn W. Cooper, from Ward 4, and George W. Bagwell, from Ward 5.

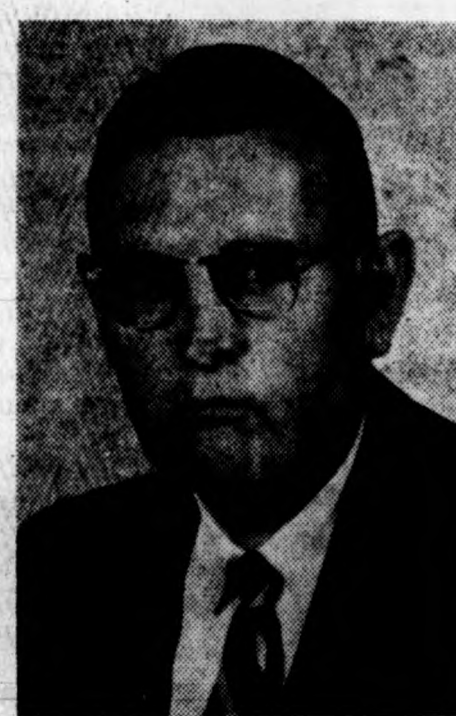

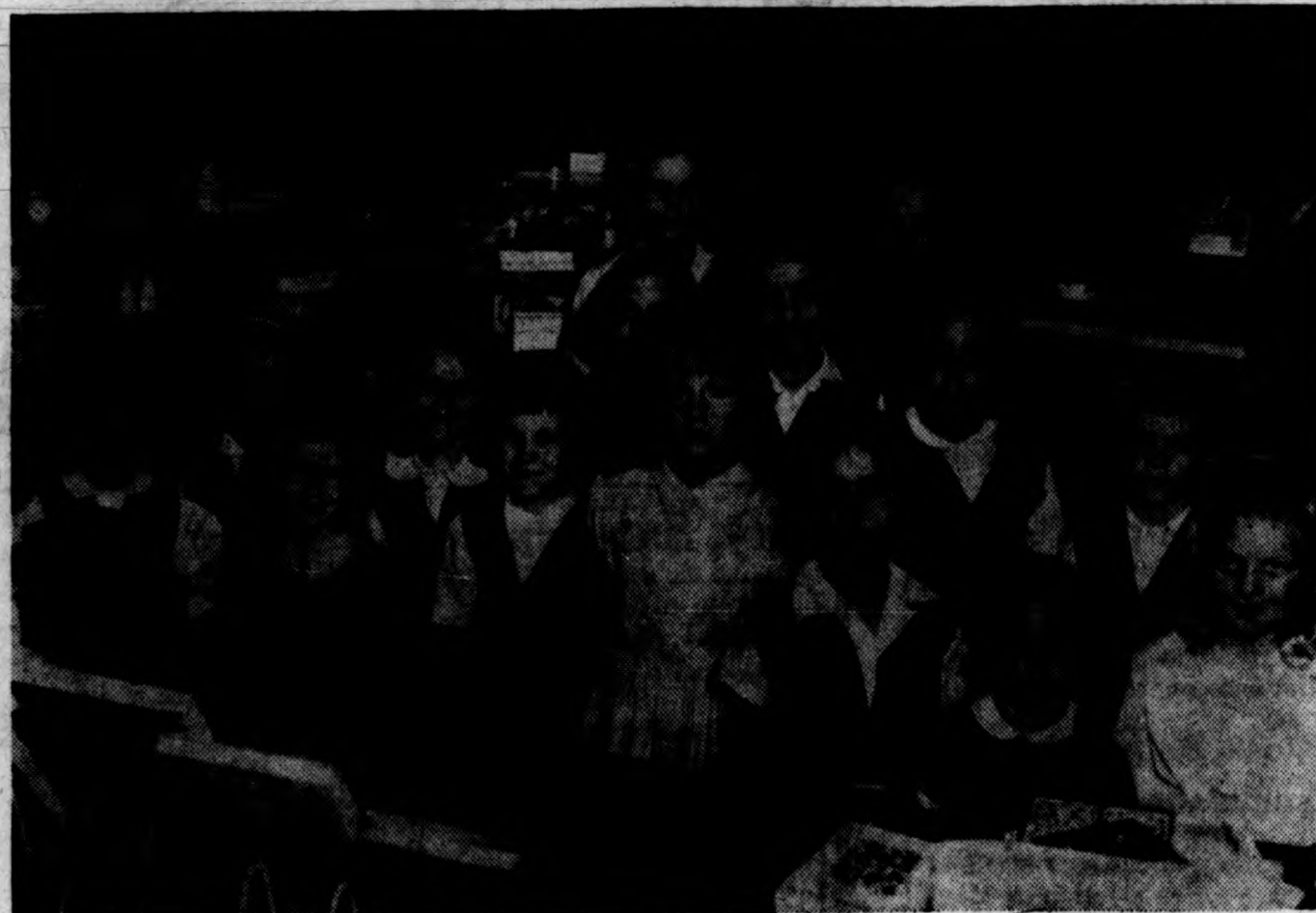
The tape also will present a brief message from Billy Graham about the valuable opportunity for Christian witnessing which is offered by radio and television.
