Records show that 68 fires burned 268 acres of woodland, compared to 73 fires burning 958 acres for the same period in the previous year. Careless smokers were determined as the leading cause of fires, with 26.

CN&L Conductor Shot By Sniper

Columbia — The conductor of a freight train was shot and slightly wounded by an apparent sniper Monday night as the train was moving into Columbia.

J. E. Hipp of Columbia was treated at a hospital and released. The bullet grazed the back of his head.

Hill was wounded while seated in the caboose at the rear of an 83-car Columbia, Newberry and Laurens Railroad train.

The shooting occurred about 9:15 p. m. near the Lexington-Richland County line off Interstate 26. Hipp said he heard the shot but did not know he had been hit until blood streamed down his head.

He said the shot apparently came from behind the train after it had passed the gunman.

Richland County officers said they could offer no explanation of the shooting.

S. C. Motorists Lose Driving Privileges

Columbia — The driving privileges of 2,161 South Carolina motorists were withdrawn during the month of June as a result of various traffic law violations. Chief Highway Commissioner Silas N. Pearman said drivers licenses of 2,140 persons were suspended while those of 21 persons were cancelled.

The June figure brought the number of driving privileges suspended, revoked and cancelled during fiscal 1963-64 to 25,980.

Pearman said failure to comply with provisions of the safety responsibility law was responsible for the largest number of withdrawals during the month.

License losses by persons between ages 14-16 accounted for the largest number of withdrawals. The next highest number was for the 17-29 age group.

Department officials said many of the license cancellations involved drivers under 21 years of age whose parents or guardians chose to withdraw their approval.

Farm Bureau Offers Two New Services

Officers and directors of the Laurens County Farm Bureau and their wives met at Vernon's Tuesday, July 21, to discuss many phases of the bureau. T. J. Copeland, county president, presided over the meeting.

Mr. Copeland introduced James M. Fleming, director of the State Farm Bureau Commodity Promotion program. Mr. Fleming explained in detail the new tire service program that has been added to the Farm Bureau's many other services.

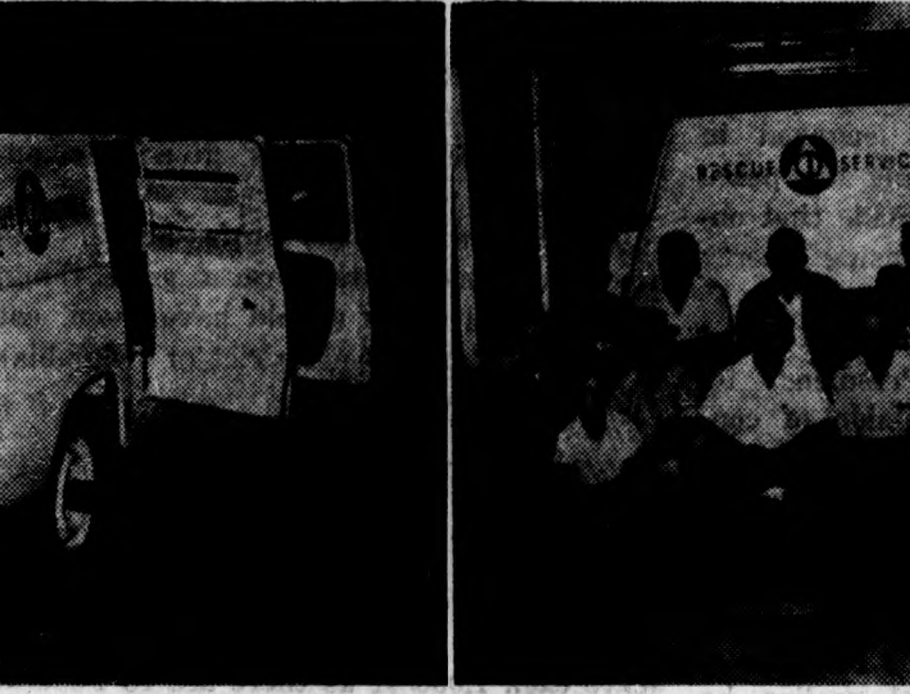

The other is a new accident and sickness plan offered only to Farm Bureau members. Details of this too may be gotten from the local Farm Bureau office.

Robbins, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of South Carolina, comes to Presbyterian College from the University of Illinois. He has been a full-time instructor there since 1960 and prior to that was a graduate assistant at University of North Carolina, 1956-60, while pursuing doctoral studies there. He expects to receive his PhD from North Carolina next June.

A native of Cambridge, Mass., Robbins received his BA degree from the University of South Carolina with Phi Beta Kappa honors in 1955. He received a scholarship to the Reed College German summer school in 1958. His doctoral dissertation concerns the folklore of the Germans in America, and he has a special interest in the lore of the German settlers in the Carolinas.
