Rabun Creek Watershed Said To Be Unfeasible

Laurens—Engineering surveys indicate that the proposed Rabun Creek watershed program for northern Laurens County is economically unfeasible, according to reports of the Planning Party of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

The surveys, conducted to determine whether any part of the proposed plan could be used, showed the entire project would be too costly to be practical.

Rocky areas of Rabun Creek would prohibit enlarging and deepening the channel to provide the desired flood protection, according to Hugh J. Dowdle, assistant state conservationist.

The project as planned would cost \$291 an acre for flood protection, Dowdle said. Maximum cost of watershed program is \$200 an acre.

Negro Worker Crushed By Logs

A 40-year-old Laurens County Negro was crushed to death Monday about 7:15 a. m. by several logs which toppled from a truck he was unloading at Standard Plywood Inc., near Clinton.

Laurens County Coroner Marshall Pressley identified the victim as George V. Woodruff. The coroner quoted a witness, John Griffin, Negro, as saying Woodruff was removing a lower guard rail on the truck when two or three logs rolled off and knocked him to the ground.

One log, 12 to 14 inches in diameter, fell on the victim and crushed him, the coroner said.



Dr. D. J. Woods, 96, Retired Minister, Dies After Illness

Rev. Dave Junkin Woods, D.D., 96, of 509 N. Broad St., died Thursday at Bailey Memorial hospital after a long illness.

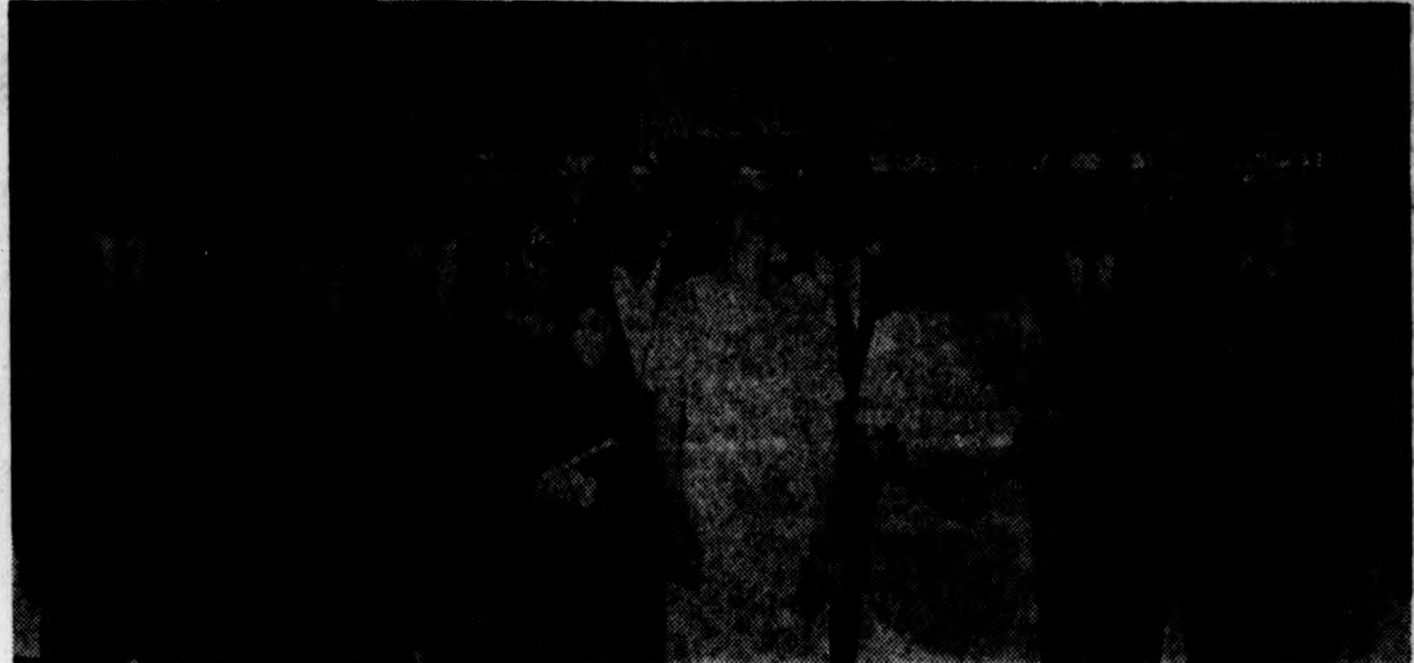
A native of New Castle, Pa., son of the late Rev. Francis Marlan and Julia Miller Junkin Woods, he spent his early childhood in Martinsburg, W. Va. He was graduated from Washington and Jefferson College in 1890, and a civil engineer from 1890 to 1893 and was graduated from Union Theological Seminary in 1896. Dr. Woods served pastorates in Blacksburg and Covington, Va., for 22 years before coming to Clinton in 1921 where he served as pastor of the First Presbyterian Church until he retired in 1940.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Fannie Cromer Ferguson Woods; a brother, J. M. Woods of Coral Gables, Fla.; a stepson, Dr. Richard B. Ferguson of Columbia; a stepdaughter, Mrs. James P. Copeland Sr. of Clinton; and a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were conducted Friday at 4 p. m. at the First Presbyterian Church by Rev. A. L. Bixler and Rev. William Redd Turner. Burial was in Rosemont Cemetery.

Pallbearers were William Broows Owens, R. E. Ferguson, I. M. Adair, Reese Young, W. P. Jacobs and T. Heath Copeland. The honorary escort included Elders of the First Presbyterian Church.

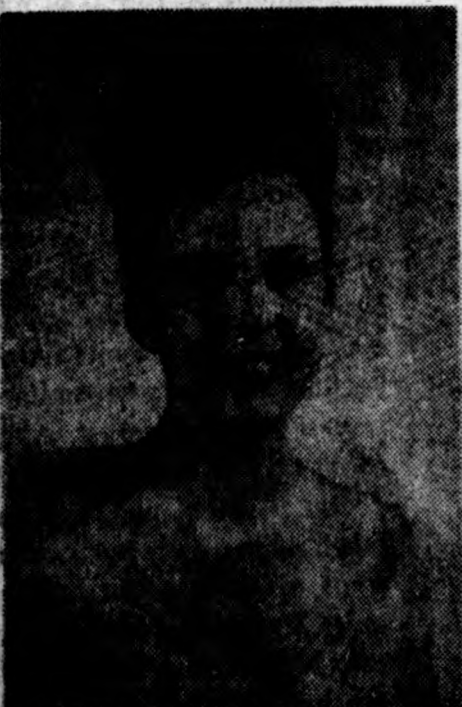
