

Plants Close for Week; Stores, Etc. on Monday

The Clinton post office, banks, most retail stores, service establishments and offices will be closed Monday in observance of Independence Day, since July 4 comes on Sunday.

Practically all manufacturing plants of the community will be closed for the entire week, it was determined by a census of the industries.

Clinton Mills, Inc., will close both of its Clinton and Lydia plants at 12 midnight Friday and resume production at 12 midnight July 11.

Joanna Cotton Mills closing period will also begin at 12 midnight Friday, to resume operations at 12 midnight July 11.

Anderson Hosiery Co., Clinton Paper Box Co., and Hallmark Shirt Co., will cease operations at the end of Friday's work hours and will reopen Monday morning, the 12th.

Mayflower Mills will shut down Friday at 11 p. m., reopening Monday morning, the 12th.

Clinton Bearings Plant of the Torrington Company will cease operations at midnight Friday and resume at 8 a. m. on the 12th.

Barber shops of the city will be closed all next week, beginning Monday.

PC Annual Giving Receives \$5,000 As Challenge to Others

A challenge grant of \$5,000 has been offered to stimulate participation in Presbyterian College's 1965 Annual Giving program, Alumni and Public Relations Director Ben Hay Hammet announced today.

He said the incentive offer comes from an anonymous friend and is dependent upon 40% participation by PC alumni. The Annual Giving program seeks a record \$85,000 this year, as compared to \$77,518 in 1964 when 30.5% of the alumni contributed to it.

Hammet said the \$85,000 sought by the 1965 effort will be used to help underwrite scholarship aid to needy students, faculty salary increases and some departmental improvements.

Parents interested in their children attending the classes must register their children and give approval for the training two days in advance of the classes.

Dr. Burton Joins Greenville Center Today

Dr. Henry B. Burton, former Clintonian, today assumes duties as fulltime psychiatrist at the Greenville Mental Health Center. He will be the first fulltime psychiatrist since the clinic was organized 15 years ago.

A 1952 engineering graduate of Clemson University, Dr. Burton served in the Army during 1953-55, following which he was associated with J. E. Sirrine & Co. in Greenville.

He later entered the Medical College of South Carolina and was graduated in 1961. He served as intern at the Baptist Medical College Hospital in Memphis, Tenn. Before taking up his work in Greenville, Dr. Burton was psychiatrist at the Medical College Hospital in Charleston.

He is the son of Mrs. G. A. Burton and the late Mr. Burton of Clinton.

Dr. Burton is a graduate of Davidson College and Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, and holds an honorary DD degree from Presbyterian College. A native of Mebane, N. C., he served the Westminster Church of Whiteville, N. C., and the Sanford (NC) First Church before going to the Morningstar Church.

The service is scheduled to begin at 8 p. m. in the open-air chapel, and all members of the Presbyterian churches of South Carolina Presbytery are invited to attend.

Three other outstanding ministers also have been invited to speak as part of month's program which, for the seventh year, designates July for special religious emphasis. Services will be held at Camp Fellowship, on shore of Lake Greenwood, each of the four Sunday nights in July.

Interior of Neville Hall At College Being Rebuilt

Presbyterian College is giving its dome-topped landmark building, Neville Hall, a general facelift that will restore the grand old lady of the campus to an appearance befitting her prominent place at the head of the west plaza.

The price tag, according to Business Manager G. Edward Campbell could run as high as \$250,000 for the extension remodeling job being conducted over two summer periods. Work began early in June, will continue through August and then will be completed during the summer months of 1966. This schedule will permit use of the building during the intervening school year.

The dome of Neville, trademark of PC since the structure was first erected in 1907, will remain. Other exterior features also will be unchanged. Emerging from all of the activity, however, will be a completely renovated interior encompassing modern language laboratory facilities, three new classrooms

and 28 additional faculty offices, as well as the refurbishing of present classrooms and office facilities and the airconditioning of the entire building.

This summer's activity is devoted to areas above the first floor. A floor is being suspended on steel beams in the old auditorium to provide space for the language lab and classrooms in the main area, and offices above. An elevator is planned to service these facilities and the projected three floors of office space that will be utilized by enclosing the inside of the dome. At the same time, steel and concrete stairways are to replace the present wooden ones.

Fraternity quarters atop the building, occupied by Pi Kappa Alpha, Pi Kappa Phi and Theta Chi, will remain. They will be serviced both by the elevator and the stairs.

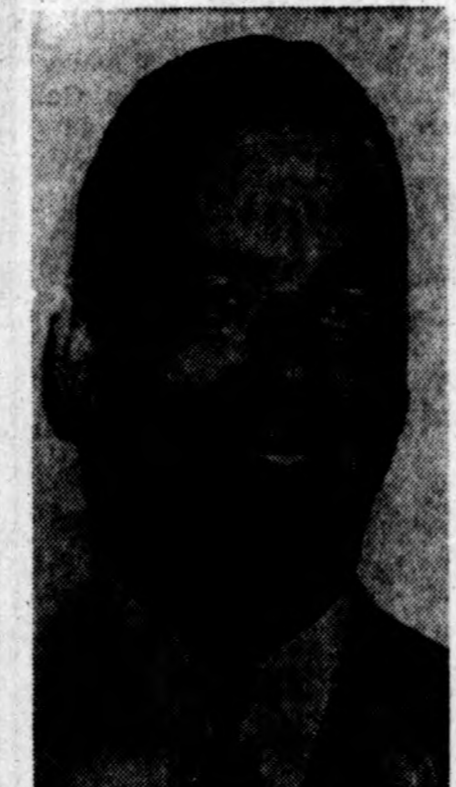
Renovation of the first floor of Neville is scheduled for next summer, at which time the wooden flooring will be replaced by terrazzo tile.

Monday night at Laurens Jerry Alexander went the full nine innings as he twirled a seven-hitter to lead Laurens 6-1. Laney again led Clinton at the plate with three hits and four RBI's. Mike Osborne also came through with a single and a triple.

In Clinton's 10 games, both Tommy Elrod and Jerry Alexander possess 2-0 records, while Johnny Rushton and Mike Osborne are 2-1. Leading hitter is Gary Laney at .467 with 16 RBI's. Johnny Alexander leads in stolen bases with 19, while he and Joel White are tied for the lead in runs scored with 10.

These and other Clinton players will attempt to regain the league lead in games tonight (Thursday, July 1) against Newberry at Newberry, and Friday night against Ware Shoals at Clinton.

Construction Begins On Enlargement of Hospital

Construction began last week on the addition to two wings to Bailey Memorial Hospital that will provide 50 new beds for the facility, raising its capacity to 102 beds.

Approximately a year will be required for completion of the work, hospital officials stated.

Cost of the expansion program, including building equipment, and professional fees will total \$541,234.05, it was said.

Of that amount, funds have been secured from the federal Hill - Burton program in the amount of \$360,822.70, while the balance of \$180,411.35 was provided by local gifts and the Duke Endowment.

Contributors were: The Torrington Company, \$20,000; Marquette Charitable Organization, \$35,000; Duke Endowment, \$50,000; Bailey Foundation, \$75,000. The small balance of \$11.35 came from the hospital general fund.

The Marquette Charitable Organization is a trust fund established by W. H. Regnery, founder of the Joanna Cotton Mills, for the benefit of education and welfare. The fund is administered by his four living children, including Walter Regnery, vice-president of Joanna Cotton Mills.

Lafayette - Tarrant Construction Co., of Columbia, is the contractor.

Hospital officials pointed out that basic facilities built into the original part of the building were sufficient to support a 100-bed hospital. Therefore, there will be no necessity to tear out and rebuild any part of the present structure. The additions will join the south and west sides of the hospital.

The hospital, opened in 1962, cost \$1,200,000, most of which came from gifts, Hill - Burton money. Taxpayers of the Clinton Hospital District are paying off a bond issue of \$449,000. A tax levy of 7 mills was imposed to help finance the original structure, later reduced to 6 mills, and still later reduced to 5 mills, the current levy.

No taxation will be required to finance the current expansion, the cost of which will raise the value of the plant to \$1,741,234.05.

The Board of Directors of the hospital include: Ryan F. Lawson, chairman, W. Carlisle Neely, David R. Meyers, John M. Simmons and Dr. George R. Blalock. Fred N. Crawford is the administrator.

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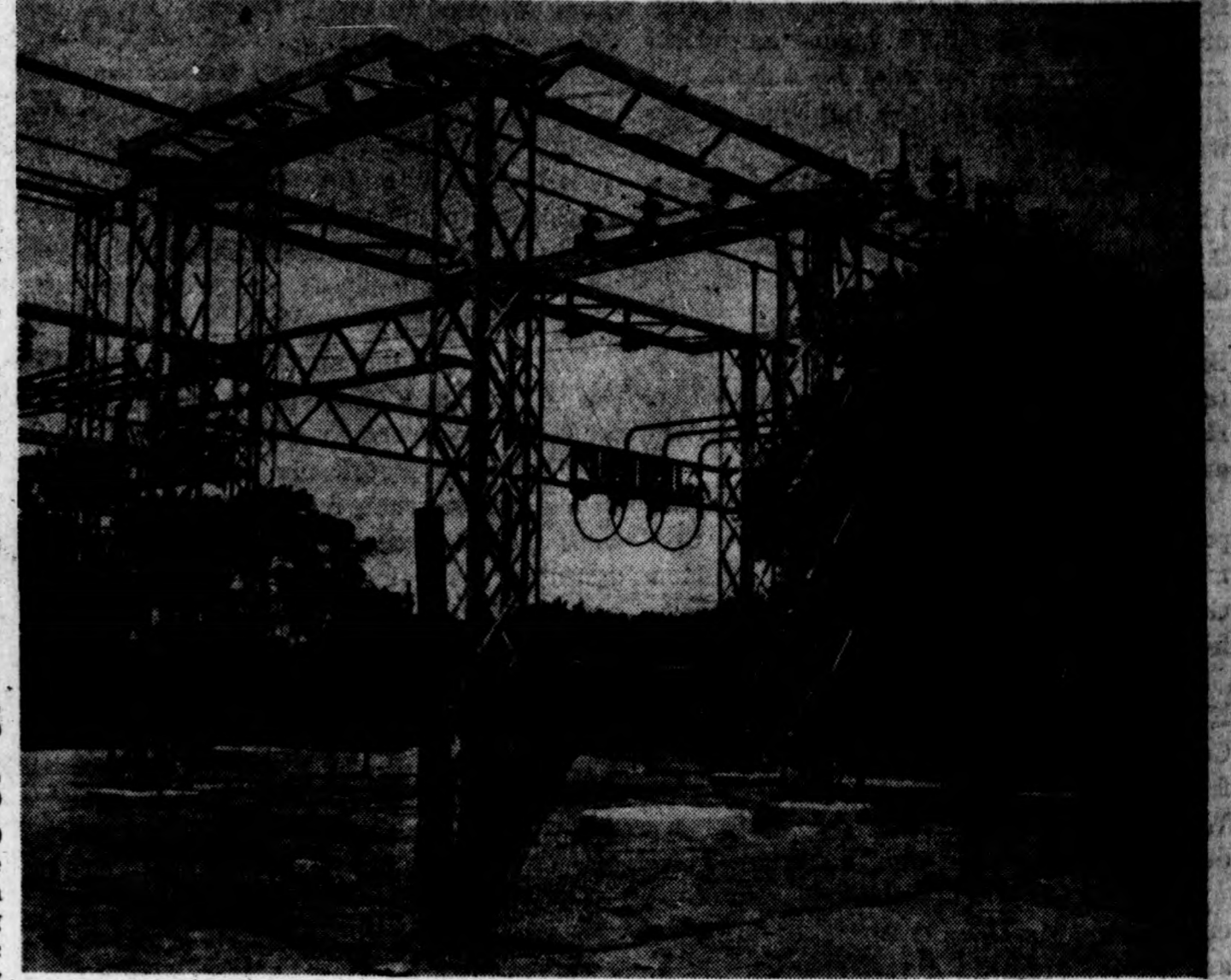
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Car Crashes on S. Broad

Youth Dies From Electric Burns Suffered on Sunday

Marvin George Harvey, 13-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Harvey of Locust St., Lydia Mill, died Monday in Self Memorial Hospital, Greenwood, about 10:30 a. m., from electrical burns suffered Sunday afternoon.

The youth came in contact with copper tubing on an electrical switch station south of the Clinton near Lydia Mill Sunday afternoon.

Power in the city electrical system was cut off for about 40 minutes. The accident occurred at 2:25 p. m., Sunday. City police were called to the scene, near Lydia Mill community, shortly after 2:30. Officer Horace Horton said when he arrived, the youth was on his back near the center of a wire fence enclosing the switch station.

The officer said nearby Negro residents, summoned by another

youth, Philip Arnold, 13, had covered the injured youth with a blanket. All of his clothing had been burned away.

Horton said the youngster was conscious and told him they were "just playing."

It was reported that the boy told relatives that he and young Arnold unwound a length of electrical wire holding a gate to the fence and entered the enclosure. Harvey climbed a still tower and was walking across an 18-foot high beam, it was stated, when he slipped and touched the energized copper tubing as he fell to the ground.

The newly constructed electrical station, put into use Sunday morning at 8:30, adjoined a Duke Power Co. substation that delivered electricity to the Clinton system. A fence was erected around the new station Saturday and

high voltage danger signs posted, according to Richard Greder, superintendent of the City of Clinton Utility system. Work crews had been at the station as late as 10:30 Sunday morning, Greder said.

The youth was taken by ambulance to Bailey Memorial Hospital, then transferred to Self Memorial Hospital in Greenwood.
