

## Lutherans Continue Plans for Building

The Executive Building Committee of St. John's Lutheran Church met last Sunday evening to receive and review reports of several study committees which were appointed about two months ago to determine the needs of the congregation.

After a session of about two hours the committee adjourned to meet again this (Thursday) evening to complete its work. It is thought, church officials stated, that after today's meeting the committee will be ready to consult an architect.

Dr. E. B. Keisler, St. John's interim pastor, commented on the fine spirit of unanimity in the committee and in the congregation. He said that any apparent slowness in getting into actual building operations is due to the desire on the part of all those involved to make thorough preparation for the proposed building program.

## Sgt. W. D. Cochrane Joins ROTC Staff At Presbyterian

First Sergeant William D. Cochrane has joined the Presbyterian College military staff to help with the training of ROTC cadets, Lt. Col. Richard W. Ulrich, professor of military science, announced today.

Sgt. Cochrane has the duty assignment of training aids sergeant and instructor of basic military science subjects.

A veteran of 17 years of Army service, he has spent 85 months of that time on overseas duty in Panama, Germany and Korea. His teaching experience includes three years as a social studies instructor and one year as a principal in the Alabama public school system.

Cochrane is married and has three children.

## College Giving Program Is Nearing Half-Way Mark

Subscriptions totaling \$38,446 put Presbyterian College's Annual Giving program near the half-way mark in seeking a record \$85,000 for 1965.

As announced today, the pace runs well ahead of any previous year at this date on the strength of increased support from alumni and friends.

Statistics show that thus far 690 donors have subscribed the \$38,446. Among alumni, 500 have given \$22,546 while 190 friends have added \$15,900.

For women in the upper part of the county, a school will be held at Harmony Church, August 19, at 2:00 p.m. The final school will be held Thursday, August 16, at 7:30 p.m. at the Agricultural Building in Laurens.

## Selective Service Board Cautions 18-Year-Old Boys

S. Louis Bond, chairman of Selective Service Local Board No. 30 for Laurens County said this week that there is a continuing responsibility for young men reaching 18 years of age to register under the Universal Military Training and Service Act.

He emphasized that each young man is required to register within five days after reaching his eighteenth birthday. Those young men who are away from their homes at that time may go to any local board in the area where they are situated, and register for Selective Service.

The local board chairman called attention to the necessity of giving the proper home address because the address given will determine the local board having jurisdiction of the case at all times. It was further pointed out that registrants should be able to identify their township of residence or their ward number so that their records will be properly identified.

Mr. Bond said that failure to comply with the law could result in a punishment of not more than five years imprisonment or not more than \$10,000 fine or both.

## Joanna Qualifies For Mail Delivery In the Community

The Joanna community is sufficiently large in terms of postal receipts and population to qualify for mail delivery service, Postmaster Dollie M. Carr stated this week.

A survey is now being made by the post office department preparatory to instituting the proposed service by foot and mounted carriers. Mrs. Carr stated.

However, she said, before the service is provided, naming of streets on standards and renumbering of all homes and businesses in the community must be completed according to a map of the post office department.

Occupants of homes and businesses will be responsible for affixing correct numbers and erecting mail receptacles, Mrs. Carr said. Numbers will be assigned when final authorization for establishment of delivery service is received.

Further information will be issued to each patron at a later date, Mrs. Carr stated, and calls regarding the proposed service are welcome at the post office.

## Hunter Bros. Get County Road Contract

The South Carolina Highway Department has announced the award of a \$118,455 contract to Hunter Brothers Construction Co. of Gray Court.

The contract for grading and surfacing on 6,536 miles of secondary routes in Laurens County was awarded on the basis of a low bid received on May 10, according to S. N. Pearman, Chief Highway Commissioner.

## Scout Alex Fraser Gets Award for Heroic Action

A Clinton Boy Scout is the recipient of the highest Scout award that can be given for heroic action.

He is Powell Alexander Fraser, Jr., 15, son of Col. and Mrs. Fraser, Col. Fraser is director of development at Presbyterian College.

Young Fraser received the Honor Medal for saving the life of a woman from the surf at St. Simons Island, Ga., on July 31, 1964.

The award was presented Tuesday evening at Camp Old Indian, N. C., by H. B. Croxton, advancement chairman of Blue Ridge Council, Boy Scouts of America, and L. L. Stanley, Council Scout Executive.

The citation was signed by Charles B. McCabe, chairman of the National Court of Honor.

Attending the ceremony were members of the Blue Ridge Council and Scout leaders from Clinton including Dr. D. O. Rhame, National Representative of the Blue Ridge Council, W. C. Baldwin and J. B. Templeton, Executive Board members of the Council, and Col. Fraser.

The following details were noted in the citation:

"When Mrs. Carrie Snyder fell off a pier built into the Atlantic Ocean at St. Simons Island, Georgia, on July 31, 1964, a young man started swimming on his back toward the woman who was floating about one hundred feet away. The rescuer was carried out by the tide and was not able to make a successful approach. Eagle Scout Powell Alexander Fraser, Jr., fifteen, arrived on the scene, sized up the situation, slipped off his shoes and shirt, and jumped from the pier. He caught the woman and, using a cross-chest carry, directed her to kick her feet to help beat the tide. She

soon became unconscious, and her rescuer tried to tow her to the pier some two-hundred yards away. He alerted bystanders and shouted for assistance, stating that artificial respiration would be needed. No swimming was allowed at the pier, because the water was infested with sharks. Authorities are convinced that Mrs. Snyder would have lost her life if it had not been for the quick thinking and fast action of Scout Fraser."

Scout Fraser received his Eagle Scout Award in November 1963. He began his Boy Scout work in Taiwan in 1960, attended Scout Camp there for two years and attended Scout Camp Roosevelt, Maryland, in 1963. In the spring of 1963 his parents moved from Alexandria, Va., where Fraser had been a member of Troop 129. Fraser is a resident of Clinton, and attends Episcopal High School in Alexandria. He is currently registered with Troop 111 in Clinton.

## Hospital Charges To Go Up Aug. 1

Daily service charges at Bailey Memorial Hospital will be increased \$1.00 beginning Aug. 1, it was stated this week.

The cost for private rooms will advance from \$19 to \$20, and semi-private rooms from \$14 to \$15.

The decision to raise the charges was made at a meeting of the board of directors on July 20, according to Fred N. Crawford, administrator. The advance in fees, he said, was to help meet increased cost of operation of the hospital.

The Joanna plant employs 1800 people, having 3,000

looms and 100,000 spindles and manufacturing shade cloth, typewriter ribbon fabric, combed lawn, combed shirtings, drapery fabrics and other apparel fabrics.

Greenwood Mills operates 12 plants in Greenwood County with 5,000 employees and has an annual payroll of \$22,000,000.
