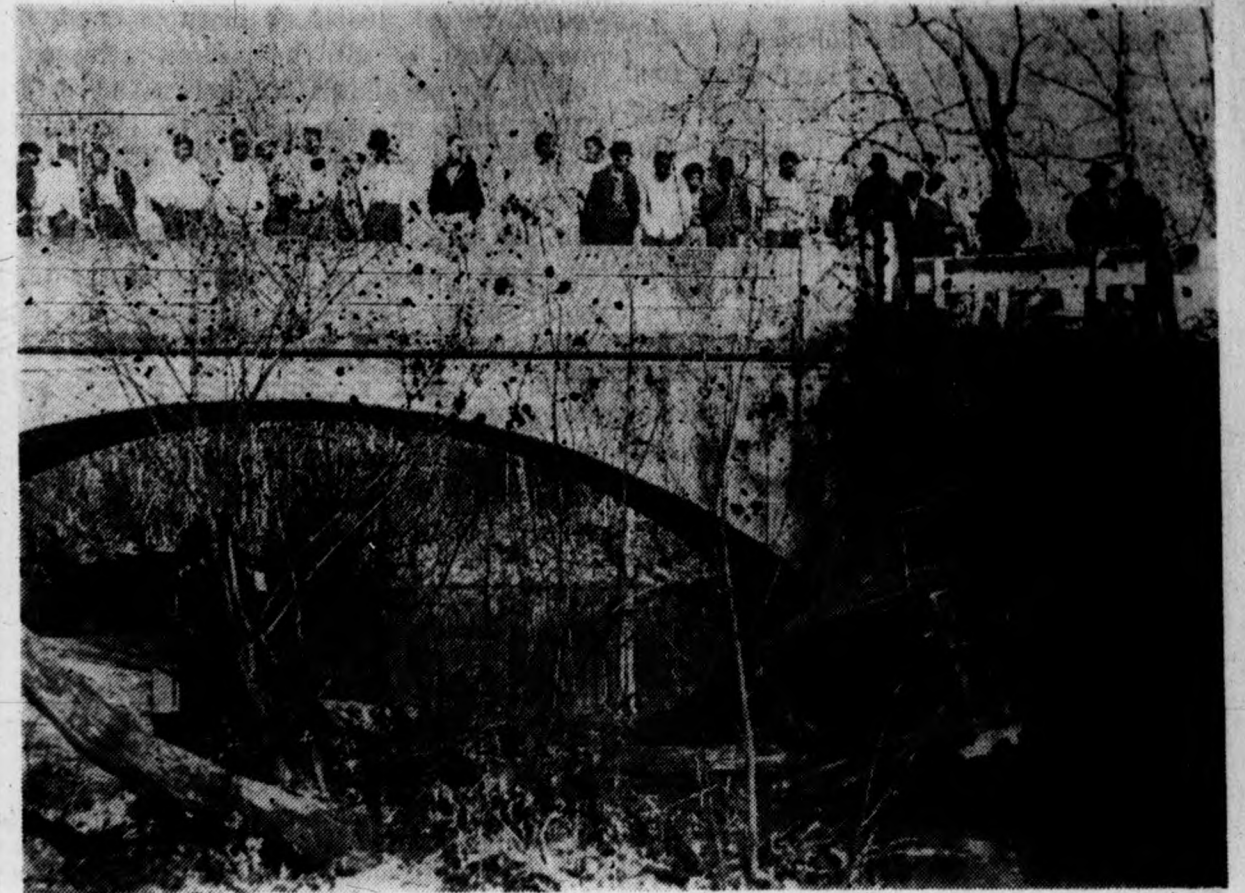
Telephone Company Plans Area Program

The Southern Bell Telephone Company is kicking off its \$3.5 million construction program in Spartanburg District, including \$221,000 in Clinton.

The \$3.5 million figure is what the telephone company will spend in this area during 1966 to expand and improve facilities, says Clinton manager D. H. Martin. For all of South Carolina, the company will have an outlay of \$35.5 million on construction to keep ahead of the rapidly-expanding demand for services.

During 1965 more than 50,000 telephones were added to Southern Bell's system in the state, including 492 here in Clinton and Joanna.

College Giving Program Sets \$100,000 Year's Goal

A record goal of \$100,000 has been established for Presbyterian College's 1966 Annual Giving program. Alumni and Public Relations Director Ben Hay Hammet announced today.

He said this objective compares to the \$93,273 produced last year, when the program recorded an all-time high that exceeded its goal and showed a 20 per cent increase over 1964.

New Visiting Hours At Local Hospital In Effect Sunday

Effective Sunday, Feb. 27, new visitation rules and procedures will go into effect at Bailey Memorial Hospital, Fred N. Crawford, administrator, stated.

Visiting hours for the general public will be from 2 to 4 p. m., and 7 to 8 p. m.

Visiting hours for two members of the family holding family visiting cards: 10 to 11 in the morning, 2 to 4 in the afternoon, and 7 to 8 in the evening.

Two visitors will be admitted to the floor to see a particular patient at one time.

If both family visiting cards are in use during regular visiting time for the general public, no additional visitor will be permitted to go to the floor.

The front entrance to the hospital will be the visitors' entrance. All other entrances will be locked except the emergency entrance and the physicians' entrance.

Upon admission, two general visitors' cards will be made up with the patient's name and room number on them. These cards will be sent to the information desk. They will be available for the use of relatives and friends of the patient during the regular visiting hours in the afternoon and evening. The cards must be returned to the information desk before another visitor may proceed to the floor.

Also upon admission, two family visiting permits will be made up for the use of the immediate family. These cards are non-transferable and the holders may visit either in the morning, afternoon or evening. The new rules and regulations for visiting at the hospital are made in consideration for the comfort and well-being of the patient and efficient operation of the hospital, Crawford said, in seeking the cooperation of the public.

Two County Negroes Are Killed When Car Leaves Road

Cross Hill — Two Laurens County Negroes were killed when their car jumped a creek and crashed into a concrete holding wall on South Carolina Highway 560 about three miles east of here early Sunday.

Laurens County Coroner Marshall Pressley identified the victims as Calvin Angus, 39, and Thomas Fuller, 37, of Rt. 1, Mountville. Another passenger in the 1955 Chevrolet station wagon, 12-year-old Henry McGowan, was reported in fair condition at a Clinton hospital.

The station wagon left the road on the right side, after rounding a sharp curve, and crashed through a wooden guard rail leading onto the Mudlick Creek bridge, according to State Highway Patrolman Gerald Dobson.

Dobson said the vehicle "sailed out over the stream in the air," crashed into the concrete holding wall and dropped straight down into the water. Laurens County Sheriff R. Eu-
