Joanna — Still noting unwholesome and unsightly conditions in the community of Joanna, the Clean-Up Committee has agreed that it will be well to extend Joanna's campaign into the summer months.

Joanna Woman's Club sponsored a poster contest to stimulate interest among the school children. Winners were Martha Abrams, Susan Livingston, Grady Stoddard, Jimmy Prater, Carolyn Anderson, Brenda Gibbs and George Gilliam. The posters have been on display in the windows of business establishments.

Pledge cards signifying cooperation were circulated by street captains. Over 300 homeowners signed the cards. The yards in general have taken on cleaner look, with the flowers and trees adding their beauty of bloom and foliage. The most constant complaint now is the unsightly garbage cans lining the streets of the community. One ornamental fence, made to enclose the cans, has been purchased by Jones Wallentine of 217 Sumter St. Others can be purchased by calling the Community Corporation.

Approximately 140 junked automobiles in the yards of homes have been reported to the committee. Mosquitoes breed in such spots. Oil leaks on dry grass can be a fire hazard. A junk dealer is working in Joanna on the Whitmore Highway at this time, burning and cutting up remains of old cars. Residents wishing this service may get in touch with Hayes Garage.

Another complaint concerns ponies and dogs being housed in too-small areas such as garages. This condition increases the number of flies and odors in hot weather.

The committee expressed itself as grateful to Greenwood Mills Community Corporation and individuals who have banded themselves together in an all-out effort to improve the looks and health conditions of Joanna.

Postal System Urged To Convert To US Savings Bonds

Postmaster W. D. Adair today urged local citizens who have funds on deposit in the abolished Postal Savings System to convert their holdings into United States savings bonds.

Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien, who is chairman of the Federal Savings Bonds Campaign, has appealed to the 930,000 Americans who have \$285,000,000 on deposit with the Post Office Department to convert their investments into United States savings bonds. Mr. Adair stated: "I join him in urging local citizens who have Postal Savings accounts to make that change which will be of great benefit to both themselves and our country. Savings bonds offer every advantage of convenience and security formerly available through Postal Savings certificates plus many other advantages unique to Savings Bonds."

Mr. Adair said details about the procedure for conversion can be obtained from him at the local post office.
