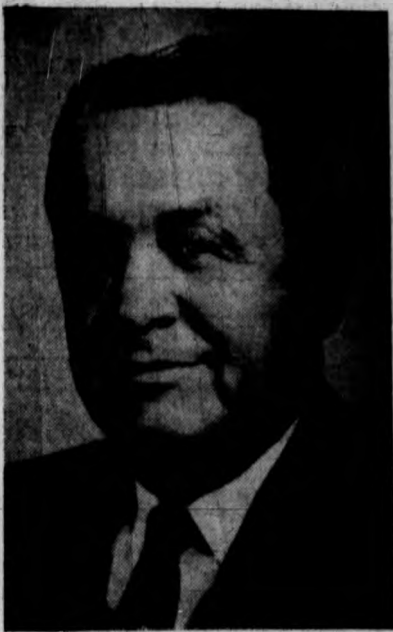


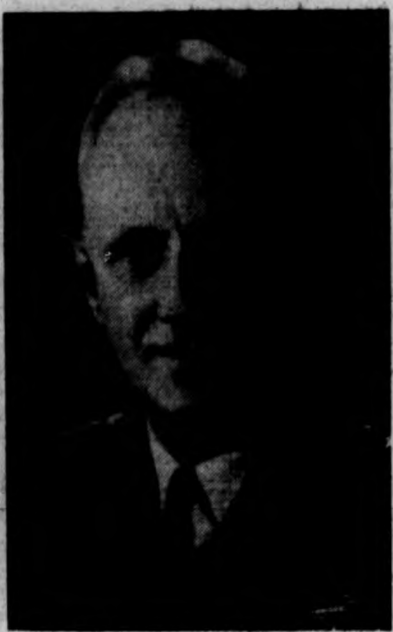

X-Ray Mobile Unit Schedule Is Given

Following several days of operation at the corner of Pitts and Broad Streets, the X-ray mobile unit will be located in Cross Hill on Monday, May 30, and at the Canada Dry Bottling Plant on West Carolina Avenue on Tuesday, May 31. Free chest X-rays will be available from 1:00-5:00.

On Wednesday, June 1, the X-ray bus will operate at the Lydia Mill office parking lot. This free service will be offered to Clinton Mill community on Thursday, June 2.

The mobile unit will be located in Joanna at Western Auto Store on Friday, June 10, from 1:00-5:00 and at Bonds Cross Roads Community Building Monday, June 13, from 1:00-5:00.

The purpose of the chest X-ray survey is to find unknown cases of tuberculosis, heart disease and lung tumor. Any abnormal findings will be reported to the family physician by the public health nurses.

Age limits are for Negro, 15 years and over and for white, 20 years and over. A chest X-ray takes only a minute and requires no undressing.

This free service is provided by the South Carolina State Board of Health, the Laurens County Health Department and the Tuberculosis and Health Association of Greenwood-Laurens counties.

Summer Program To Include Tennis, Softball League

The Clinton Recreation Commission will offer a summer program providing both softball and tennis participation for local young people, it was announced this week.

Instruction in tennis will be offered each Monday through Friday beginning Monday morning, June 6, at the Clinton High School courts at 9 o'clock. In case of rain that day, instruction is scheduled to begin Tuesday, June 7. All young people interested in participating are asked to bring two balls marked by name, and a racquet.

All girls are invited to take part in a softball program which will consist of four teams from all areas of the city.

Practice will begin Monday, June 6, at 3 p.m. in the following locations: Girls who live in the Lydia area, behind Providence School; Bailey area, Cavalier Park; those who live south of the railroad, meet behind the Armory; those who live north of the railroad, meet behind Clinton High School.

Practice will run approximately one week before the tournament begins. All tournament play will be held on the softball field behind Clinton High School.

Mrs. Frank Ramage is in charge of the tennis and girls' softball phases of the city recreation program.

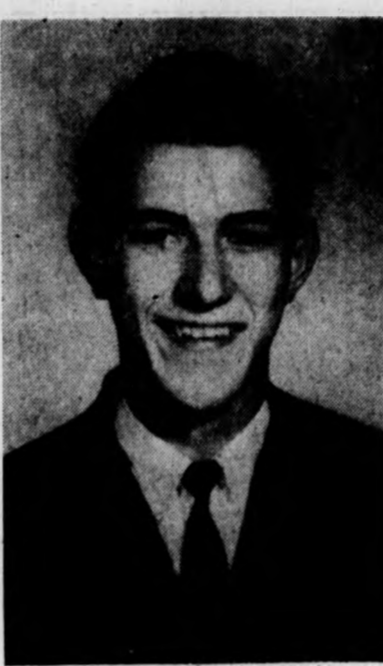

Teague Services Today At First Baptist Church

Word was received here last week of the death of Pvt. John Walter Teague, 19, who was killed in action in South Viet Nam May 17 while serving with Company B, 2nd Battalion, 8th Regiment, 1st Cavalry, in the Me Kong area.

Pvt. Teague, who was the son of Mrs. Lila Matthews Teague of 2301 Chapel Hill Rd., Durham, N. C., was the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde O. Teague, who reside in Smallwood, Clinton.

Born in Greenwood, Pvt. Teague was the son of the late Ralph O. Teague. He had made his home here with his grandparents since the age of two and a half years. He attended Clinton public schools prior to enlisting in the service, with which he

had been stationed in Viet Nam since August, 1965.

In addition to his mother and paternal grandparents, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Patricia Ann Broadwell of Durham.

Funeral services will be held today (Thursday) at 2:30 at the First Baptist Church, conducted by the Rev. E. W. Rogers and the Rev. W. W. Willingham. Interment will be in Maplewood Cemetery, Durham, N. C., at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Pallbearers will be Dusty James Rhodes, Jr., Johnnie Cannon, Eddie Braswell, Carroll Smith, Harold Smith and Sidney Hartzog.

The body is at Gray Funeral Home following arrival yesterday afternoon.

County Library Is Recognized For Weekly Programs

The Laurens County Library has received statewide recognition for one of its weekly programs in a recent monthly publication of the S. C. State Library Board, "News for Public Libraries."

In the bulletin which is distributed to library trustees and staff members in the state, the local library was commended for its "outstanding" weekly program of movies.

The feature story, "Interesting Programs Can Boost Library Support", tells how the local project was started after the library received a movie projector from the Wednesday Study Club of Laurens.

Mrs. Harriet Huff, county librarian, is quoted in the article as saying arrangements were made to order films through various advertising firms.

"The films, largely travelogues with an occasional art or science feature, are free — the library pays only the return postage on them," the article states.

Continuing, "a schedule of films is posted in the library; a staff member previews each film; introduces it and relates to available library books. This program has become a regular family activity for many people in the area. Mrs. Huff reports that audiences are always large, sometimes to the point of overflow, and always enthusiastic."

It concluded by saying "the movies have brought people into the library who had never visited it before, and they have increased community interest and participation in library programs in general."

Joanna Clean-Up Drive Continuing

The Joanna clean-up campaign is showing some progress in the beautification project, and it is requested that residents of the community move garbage cans from the house fronts to the rear areas or behind shrubs and fences. It is suggested that cartons and cardboard boxes be torn apart so that collection may be quicker and more compact, and notification be given the collectors as to where cans will be placed.

132 Get Diplomas At High School Service

The 1966 commencement program of Clinton High School came to a close Monday evening when 132 members of the graduating class — 63 girls and 69 boys — received diplomas and certificates.

The exercises were held in Belk Auditorium on the Presbyterian College campus and were attended by an overflow crowd of parents, relatives and friends.

Speakers were the scholastic leaders of the class and the class president. "Are We Prepared?" was the theme of the address, and the subject was developed by each succeeding speaker: Tom Baldwin, class president, "By the Past"; Ronnie Traylor, salutatorian, "In the Present"; Bill Jacobs, valedictorian, "For the Future."

Presentation of diplomas and certificates to the members of the class was by R. P. Wilder, superintendent of School District 56, and A. W. Shealy, principal of Clinton High School.

Mr. Shealy announced the winners of several scholarships and awards.

The prelude and processional music was by Nancy Hollis at the piano. Tommy Johnson, president of the student council, gave the invocation.

Shelia Gilliam, soprano, sang a solo, and the school musical selection. The singing of the alma mater by the glee club presented a special class closed the program.

Baccalaureate Service

The baccalaureate service was held Sunday evening at a city-wide union service, also in Belk Auditorium, with the sermon delivered by the Rev. E. W. Rogers, pastor of Broad Street Methodist Church.

Several local pastors who participated in the program included Rev. J. D. Medley, the invocation; Rev. Zeb C. Williams, prayer; Rev. A. L. Bixler, scripture; and Dr. E. B. Keisler, benediction.

Music was presented by Johnny Fulmer, pianist, who played the prelude processional, and recessional. A special musical selection was sung by the high school glee club.

Candidates for mayor and the other three aldermen were nominated the previous Tuesday.

They were J. J. Cornwall for mayor; Boyd Holtzclaw for alderman from Ward 1; Lynn W. Cooper, Sr., Ward 2; and George W. Bagwell, Ward 5.

Cornwall and Bagwell will face Republican opponents in the general election in August.

Owens defeated W. Alvin Hueble Tuesday for the Ward 2 aldermanic post. The vote was: Owens, 696; Hueble, 581.

Bragg bested Harry C. Layton, incumbent, for Ward 3 alderman. The vote was: Bragg, 852; Layton, 423.

Sanders, incumbent in Ward 6, defeated James C. Craine in the run-off. The vote was: Sanders, 717; Craine, 552.

The new council will take office September 1.

Synod of Georgia To Convene at PC Tuesday for 2 Days

June will be "bustin' out all over" with significant church meetings at Presbyterian College as both the Synods of Georgia and South Carolina visit the campus for their annual stated sessions.

Georgia Presbyterians, who also support PC, will open the activity when they arrive next Tuesday for their two-day 122nd stated meeting. More than 200 delegates are expected for this affair at which the major business of the synod will be conducted.

Altogether, six big occasions — five of them in June — are scheduled for PC's summer season. Well over 1,000 men, women and young people from both supporting synods will visit the campus during this period.

Industrial leaders of the state will follow the Georgia group here next Thursday and Friday for the Industrial Management Workshop of the South Carolina State Chamber of Commerce. It marks the eighth year this workshop has been held at Presbyterian.

Then, the South Carolina Presbyterian Synod will use PC as the scene for its stated session on June 6-8. As with all groups, the dormitories, dining, classroom and recreational facilities are made available to the visitors.

The pattern will vary again the next week, when Presbyterian women of South Carolina hold their annual Synodical Training School at PC on June 13-17. It's under the direction of Mrs. Walter S. Moore of Walhalla, Synodical president and school dean.

Two groups of young people will follow. Congaree (SC) Presbytery will be on the PC campus, June 20-25, for its Senior High Fellowship Conference. And another Senior High Conference will bring boys and girls from Augusta, Macon (Ga.) Presbytery here on July 11-16 to round out the summer meeting schedule.

College Commencement Scheduled for Sunday

General Harold K. Johnson, United States Army Chief of Staff, will deliver the main address Sunday at Presbyterian College's 86th Commencement exercises, which may prove the most action-packed six hours in PC history.

He will share the spotlight that day with a leading Presbyterian minister, two outstanding alumni, 93 graduating seniors, a brand-new science building and an array of past honorary degree recipients.

The Sunday program will start with the 11 a.m. baccalaureate sermon preached by Dr. Vernon Broyles, pastor of Atlanta's North Avenue Presbyterian Church. The commencement address by General Johnson — fresh from an inspection tour of South Viet Nam — is set for 4:15 p.m., when graduates will receive their diplomas, army commissions and special awards. Both affairs will be held in Belk Auditorium.

Southern Bell To Change Dial Tone Next Week

Clinton's telephone dial tone will change its sound next week, says Southern Bell Manager Harrod Martin.

"We are installing additional equipment that will make touch-tone service available here next month," Martin said. In order for this equipment to function, the familiar "buzz" of the dial tone will be changed to a much lower pitch next Friday, June 3.

Martin said that a letter is being sent to each Clinton telephone subscriber explaining the change. "We do this because in other parts of the country when this change was made people thought their phones were out of order," Martin explained.

He added that touch-tone service means that telephones will be available with a modern push button keyboard instead of the familiar rotary dial. This service will be available in mid-June.

Miss Surratt Gets Lander Service Key

At recent class day exercises at Lander College, Greenville, Miss Jennie Rae Surratt, of Joanna, was among students receiving keys for service on the student council.

Two PC alumni also will be awarded honorary degrees during the afternoon. Emmet R. Blake, curator of birds at Chicago's Field Museum of Natural History, will receive the doctor of science degree; and Ross E. Templeton of Charlotte, senior assistant vice-president of Field Enterprises Educational Corporation, the doctor of humanities.

Between the baccalaureate service and the closing commencement exercises, the schedule calls for a luncheon in the college dining hall with graduates and their families as guests, a special luncheon for General Johnson and persons who have previously received honorary degrees from PC, dedication of Richardson Hall of Science, the president's reception and open house, and pre-commissioning services for ROTC cadets who will be receiving the bars of second lieutenant.

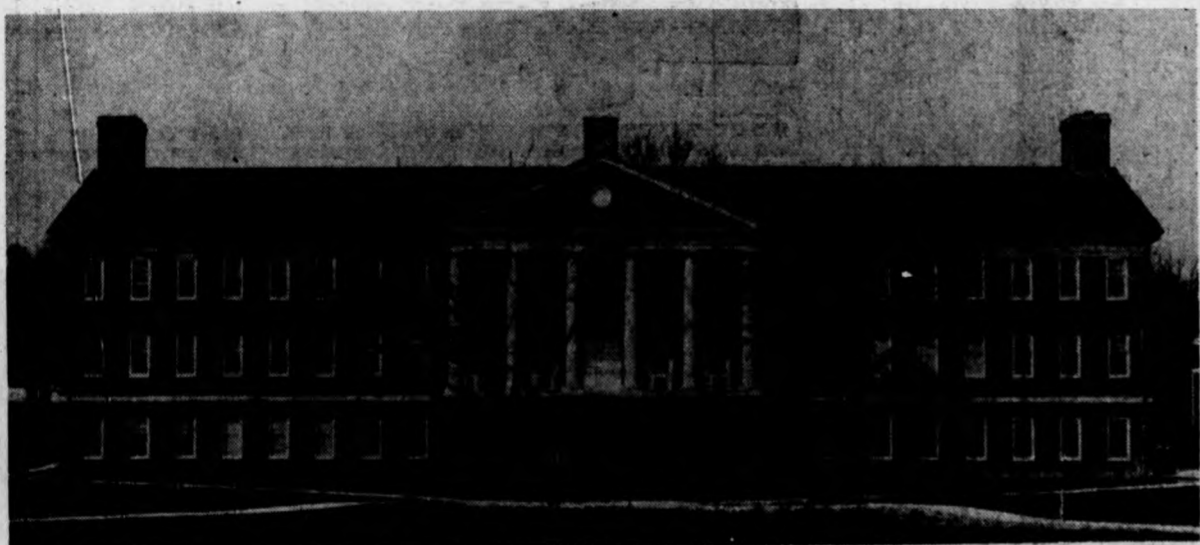

College to Dedicate New Science Hall on Sunday

Presbyterian College will dedicate its new science building in honor of benefactor H. Smith Richardson at the college's 86th Commencement this Sunday.

A litany of dedication by President Marc C. Weersing is scheduled as part of the 4:15 p.m. final exercises at which General Howard K. Johnson, United States Army Chief of Staff, will deliver the main address. The response to the litany will be given by Mr. Richardson, 80-year-old honorary chairman of the

Vick Chemical Company. Included as part of the dedication activities is the annual President's Reception and Open House, shifted this year from President Weersing's home to Richardson Hall to provide time for visitors to tour the building. It is set for 2:30 p.m., following a luncheon honoring Mr. Richardson and other recipients of honorary degrees from PC and General Johnson.

Richardson Hall of Science, termed one of the finest science facilities in the state, became full occupied this spring after one and a half years under construction. It rose as one of a three-building complex to form the East Plaza. The new Greenville Dining Hall and Clinton Hall Women's dormitory, completed sooner, were dedicated last December.

H. Smith Richardson, a native of Greensboro, N. C., became president of the Vick Chemical Company in 1919, stepped up to chairman of the board in 1929 and assumed the position of honorary chairman upon his retirement in 1957. Presbyterian College recognized his unique leadership as a Christian businessman by awarding him an honorary doctor of laws degree in 1937.
