When do you spray or dust cantaloupes for worms? Cantaloupes should be dusted or sprayed as soon as blooms opear. This should be done at regular intervals to keep he worms out. In fact, thrips and flea beetles do a great deal of damage to cantaloupes. I have a row in my arder,, and they didn't start rowing until I had dusted hem a couple of times. It is urprising the number of insects that damage the garden. Sucking insects usually have already done their damage before it is noticed.




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
