

County Agent's FARM NEWS

Small grain harvest is well underway. In fact, the recent rain damaged oats and barley. Rain will change the color of grain and most always cause it to fall to the ground, especially if it is dead ripe. Oats seem better than usual; barley about average or better. Wheat is good. Now is the time for farmers to get their seed for fall planting and keep it separate. Seed cleaners usually have the

burden of storing the farmers' seed in order to get the cleaning. Yes, now is the time for you farmers who do not have your next year's seed to locate the fields that have clean weed seed, that have the quality, and a field you desire. See that the seed is cleaned and treated before planting time. We at the County Agent's office keep information on the latest recommended varieties, so call

us if you want the information.

I visited Messrs. Ed and Tom Milam last week where they were cutting a field of oats. Saw one of the best fields of oats I have come across this year. The combine was being run by a couple of energetic young men, Rut Jacks and Phil Rogers. The combine belongs to James Jacks, and the boys are doing custom work throughout the community. They were cutting at the Milam's when I stopped by.

When do you spray or dust cantaloupes for worms? Cantaloupes should be dusted or sprayed as soon as blooms appear. This should be done at regular intervals to keep the worms out. In fact, thrips and flea beetles do a great deal of damage to cantaloupes. I have a row in my yard, and they didn't start showing until I had dusted them a couple of times. It is surprising the number of insects that damage the garden. Sucking insects usually have already done their damage before it is noticed.

I've seen some beautiful fields of cotton this spring. It has begun to square in the lower part of the county. June is the month that farmers must give an all-out effort to destroy the over-wintered adult weevils.

The cotton should receive an application of insecticide every five days for the remainder of June. It is believed that all adult weevils are out of hibernation by July 4. This is pretty well known through research. Farmers received the recommended insecticides the past week. "Let's get with it!"
