**How Can I?**

**Q. What is a good treatment for water-soaked leather shoes?**

A. Stuff the shoes with newspaper or uncooked oatmeal, then let dry away from radiators, stoves, or any kind of direct heat. After they have dried, rub with half a raw potato before polishing, and this will help them to take on a good gloss.

**Q. How can I wash a chamois skin?**

A. Wash carefully in warm soapy water, don't rinse the soap out, and press the chamois carefully on a flat surface to dry. Best not to hang the chamois in the air, since this will usually make it hard and dry.

**Q. How can I forestall the tarnishing of some of my brass articles?**

A. With a coat of clear lacquer, being sure that the surface of the metal is clean and free of polish before applying the lacquer. A second coat will provide even greater insurance.

**Q. How can I clean the blacked andirons in my fireplace?**

A. Remove those black deposits with white gasoline (do this out-of-doors, of course), and follow with a kitchen cleanser, and then complete the cleaning chore with metal polish. Clean any pitted areas with a vinegar-salt solution, then rinse quickly.

**Q. How can I mend broken marble?**

A. Make a stiff paste of Portland cement and water, and then after cleaning the edges of the broken marble thoroughly, apply the cement paste to both edges, press together tightly, and tie in place until set.
