How Can I?

Q. What can I do about white furs that have yellowed?

A. Many white furs are originally bleached with a "reducing bleach," and after a time they take on oxygen from the air and begin to turn yellow. This can be overcome usually by spraying on a solution of hydrogen peroxide or by brushing with a soft brush. Sometimes the hanging of the fur in the sun afterwards will speed up the restoration process.

Q. How can I, when preparing my laundry starch, prevent the formation of skin over my starch solution?

A. By covering the bowl with a piece of cloth, stretched tight, as soon as the starch is mixed.

Q. How can I recondition shredded coconut that has become hard and tough?

A. Try heating it over some hot water.

Q. Is there any way I can prevent a paintbrush from shedding bristles during the painting process?

A. One way is to give it a varnish treatment. You do this by placing the bristles up and pouring clear varnish into the base of the bristles, keeping the brush in an upright position until the varnish has dried and "glued" the bristles into place.

Q. How can I make sure of the removal of cosmetic stains from the necklines of dresses I am washing?

A. A good hair shampoo rubbed into these stained areas before the dresses are put into the washer will leave the fabric clean and fresh-looking when it finally emerges.

Q. How can I keep cream from curdling?

A. If the sweetness of the cream seems doubtful, stir a pinch of baking soda into it. This prevents curdling, even in hot coffee.

Q. How can I remove "fuzz balls" on sweaters?

A. Sometimes just the brushing over of the sweater with a dry sponge will remove these fuzz balls. Or, if this method fails, give the sweater a gentle shave with a safety razor. Then, after the sweater is brushed, it will look ever so much better.

Q. How can I clean shoe brushes?

A. Soak them in warm soapy water to which a few drops of turpentine or mineral spirits have been added. Many such cleaning tips and shortcuts are contained in my new "How Can I???" book.

Q. How can I discourage tarnish on my silverware?

A. One of the simplest preventives is thorough rinsing after washing. Even the slightest tinge of soap residue invites tarnish.

Q. How can I remove dark streaks and non-greasy smudges from my pastel-colored walls?

A. Usually, an ordinary gum eraser will do the trick.

Q. How can I clean rusted or corroded metal surfaces quickly?

A. An ordinary rubber eraser dipped into emery powder is an effective scourer for cleaning off these rusted or corroded metal surfaces.
