### **Postmaster General To Visit Laurens County**

(Special To The Chronicle) COLUMBIA—Winton Blount, the new Postmaster General of the United States, will visit Laurens County March 26 for the opening of the Benjamin F. Shaw Company plant.

Construction of the plant is nearing completion on the old Laurens airport site near Laurens.

Blount, former president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, also is former chairman of the board of the Shaw Company.

Laurens County Reps. David S. Taylor and Paul Culbertson have introduced legislation to invite Blount to address a joint session of the South Carolina General Assembly.

The legislation has been passed in the House of Representatives and now goes to the Senate.

Ronald Gorham Cathey of Clinton last week was sentenced to three years in prison, suspended to three months and three years' probation, in conjunction with the Christmas Eve death of his wife, Mrs. Lena Cathey.

In General Sessions Court in Laurens Wednesday, Feb. 19, Cathey, 27, pleaded guilty to involuntary manslaughter. He was the driver of the car which collided with another car on Secondary Road 46 about two miles north of Clinton on Dec. 24, 1968.

Mrs. Cathey was fatally injured in the accident.


