## Clinton has always had good transportation.

 For many years there were eight passenger trainsin and out of Clinton each day and several in both directions at night. There were four I want to mention. One in each direction on the C. N. \& L.

There was not a diner on either of them. Mr. B. L. King operated the Clinton Hotel close by the Union Depot. His dining room was famous for its good

a number of paper bag lunches. One of these help. ers would walk beside the train yelling, "Get your
