He spoke of world complexities but suggested these should be days of optimism and confidence in our country instead of fear and suspicion. He added:

"I am not convinced that we have lost the colleges and the students. I think we have observed the painful process of sensitive men seeking solutions to the injustices they feel exist in our world today. I think the college campuses have been exploited for political gain by many persons who would prefer to destroy that which we would have them improve. But I do not think the men of violence speak for today's generation."

Intermittent showers failed to dampen the day-long commencement program, and an overflow crowd jammed into Belk Auditorium for the final afternoon exercises which featured Governor McNair's address.


