Clinton City Council voted unanimously Monday night to request that members of the new County Council in Laurens County be elected by districts, with one member elected at large.

Council took the action on the recommendation of the Clinton Planning Commission which this week completed a study of the legislation setting up the County Council method of governmental operation for Laurens County.

Noting that there were no district residency restrictions for candidates for County Council, the Planning Commission recommended that the legislation be amended to require that two of the County Councilmen come member of Council elected at large. The Commission recommended that all five members would be voted on by all voters in the county but they would be candidates to represent specific

The Planning Commission made its recommendation after it was pointed out in general discussion that all five members of County Council might be residents of one area of the county. The commission felt their suggested amendment would help guarantee a geographic distribution of County Council members.

The Planning Commission took its action after studying the County Council legislation point-bypoint with Presbyterian College Professor Earl B. Halsall, whom they had requested to make a study of the legislation.

Sen. Long said South Carolina enacted more tax increases last year than anytime in the state's history.

"Without any increases in taxes, the general revenue funds will bring in an additional 40 million to the state treasury this year," he said. Long said the legislature should find some means to operate the government within the framework of this additional revenue and should not enact new

The proposal would increase the gasoline tax from seven to eight cents. North Carolina increased its gasoline tax by two cents last year.


