Pee Dee Summer School.

The Superintendent of Education of this county was in Hartsville, S. C., last week, Thursday 16th inst., where he had the pleasure of meeting in joint conference with Hon. O. B. Martin and the county superintendents of the following counties: Marlboro, Marion, Florence, Darlington and Lee.

Now it is the purpose of the above named counties to unite and hold a District summer school at Hartsville, which does away with the summer school in the counties so united.

Chesterfield has fallen in line with this work and therefore will have no county summer school this year.

Let me say that this District school was held at Hartsville last year and was a decided success. The work done there has been some of its highest terms.

Without the Pee Dee section, I might say throughout the year and we are expecting even greater success for 1905.

Utmost care has been taken in selecting the faculty for this school, and we are perfectly satisfied in saying that a number of the very best instructors of the State will have charge of the work.

One feature that strikes us as most important is the course in primary work.

Most teachers of this county are burdened with work of this grade, and to such, I would suggest the Pee Dee Summer School as a relief, to at least a portion of the burden.

Let me say further that the primary teacher is not the only one that might be benefitted, for each teacher may take a course in just what he or she may need most.

One other feature to which I would call attention is the fine course of lectures which will be arranged. This, together with the primary work, especially Frye's Geography, will be worth the while of our teachers attending.

Now let me suggest to the trustees of the different schools that you secure your teacher now, and the fact that he knows what and where his work will be next session will stimulate him or her, as the case may be, to attend the summer school and thus be better qualified to give you efficient service.

Furthermore it would not be bad policy to let your teacher know that you would bear at least a part of his or her expense in attending this school, especially where you have ample funds. By so doing your teacher will return to you next session and repay you fourfold with good service.

This school will be in session from June 14th to July 10th. The faculty will be announced later.

The writer hopes to arrange a meeting with the teachers in the different sections of the county in the near future, and discuss the subject more fully. Will announce the date and place of these meetings later.
