MR. R. E. DIGGS SAYS CROPS ARE POOR.

Mr. F. B. Sineath Has Best Crop Between Virginia and Georgia -Mr. Watson Has a Fair Stand

Mr. Editor-I have been travelling for several weeks looking over hhe crops as I go, and I have gone over a great part of the two Carolnas and the majority of the places that I have had the pleasare of visiting have very poor crops and poor prospects-no stand, and what stand they have got is little yellow stuff.

I found three or four places where they had fair stands. Mr. Jim Watson has an average crop. When I left Mr. Watson's place I went on to Cheraw and from Cheraw I walked down to Montrose. I saw some one off from the road, scious. Gen. Bragg was consul to Cuba, but was recalled after he was paying from \$11,000 to \$13,plowing around the house, as walked up there I thought that it was the garden spot of Chesterfield county, and having a curiosity to know who lived there I went ap to the house and to my surprise i found Mr. F. B. Sineath there. Well I was glad I went by there, it was about ten o'clock in the morning. He had his boys to take their mules from the plows and come in, then we all went to the house and talked of old times and around and dinner was served. After dinner was over the boys went back to their work and Mr. Sineath walked over the crop and there I found the best crop that I have seen between the Virginia state line and the northern boundary of Georgia. His cotton had a good stand and an average of six to eight leaves to the stalk. His corn was fine also, averaging about ten inches in height and had a healthy color. We then went down to his pasture where he had about eleven hogs and several ltle pigs, all looking fine. Returning to the house we came up the back way through his orchard. it was was one of the nicest orchards that I have seen in many a a d.y. The trees were hanging with fruit. I wish that you could se his place, everything looks so nice and encouraging, every one ther seems to be enjoying life. I just think that if every one in Cheterfield county had the prospeets of such a success before them that he has, they would not

#### Committee Appears Before Railroad Commissioners.

The committee appointed by the board of trade consisting of Messrs W. T.. Thrower, who have been working on the freight rates to Cheraw for a year and who had the matter up before the railroad people in Richmond about a year ago, and since that time have taken the matter to every official of the Seaboard, from the President down, asking relief from the discriminating freight rates, and receiving none, appeared yesterday before the railroad commission in Colnmbia, and showed to them Cheraw was circled by five competing towns, each of which had a bitter freight rate than Cheraw had, the difference running from 10 to 25 per cent., and three of the five have a longer haul than Cheraw, and no one of the five is doing as much business as Cheraw
