COUNTRY SWEEP BY DEMOCRATIC WAVE.

Great Change Is Expected.

Many Big States Take a Position in the Democratic Column—Dix Wins in New York By Handsome Majority Over Stimson, the Republican Nominee.

Elections held throughout the country Tuesday resulted in a political convulsion of far-reaching extent, similar at many points to the famous tidal wave of 1882 and apparently more widespread in its effect.

The indications are that the national house of representatives has been carried by the democrats, reversing the present republican majority of 43. The United States senate will probably have a reduced republican majority as a result of legislative elections held in many states.

Democrats Get Many Governors.

In New York state John A. Dix, democratic candidate for governor, is elected over Henry L. Stimson, republican, by a plurality of about 55,000, reversing the republican plurality of 70,000 in 1908 for Governor Hughes.

In New Jersey Woodrow Wilson, democratic candidate for governor, is elected over Vivian M. Lewis, republic

John A. Dix, a business man and the first democratic nominee in sixteen years, will be the next governor of New York. He was chosen by the people Tuesday over Henry L. Stimson, republican, for whom Theodore



Roosevelt stumped the state, by a plurality, based on nearly complete returns, from 55,000 to 65,000. New York city gave him a plurality of more than 100,000, while Stimson came down to the Bronx with about 10,000, leaving a substantial lead for the democratic nominee.

Thomas F. Conway, the democratic nominee for lieutenant governor, appears to have swept into office only slightly behind Dix.

C. O. P. Loopes Up-State. The normal republican majority upstate was greatly reduced. The inclement weather tended to cut out in the rural vote, and Stimson's estimated plurality to the borders of New York city—about 40,000—is less by approximately 8,000 than the upstate plurality of Hughes in 1908.

Both the assembly and senate returns ran strongly democratic, and there were some notable upsets in even the congressional districts. Representative Herbert Parsons, a life-long friend and political associate of Theodore Roosevelt, and formerly chairman of the republican county committee, was ousted by Jefferson M. Levy, representative of W. W. Coker, of Nassau county, Theodore Roosevelt's home seat, was tipped out by Martin W. Littleton. William S. Bennett was defeated for congress by Henry George, a son of the political economist.

Sereno E. Payne, father of the tariff bill, was re-elected, but his home town, Auburn, went for Dix; and Vice President Sherman's candidate for congress was defeated by a democrat. Representative Hamilton Fish, republican, gave ground to Richard E. Connel, a democrat.

FLORIDA ELECTIONS.

Defeat Is Given State-Wide Prohibition Proposition. Reports indicate that the constitutional amendment for state-wide prohibition has been defeated by an estimated majority of between 2,000 and 3,000. Duval county, Jacksonville, returned a vast majority of approximately 3,000, while the Tampa vote is close, and is claimed by both factions. The local politicians pulled their best votes in St. Johns county, St. Augustine, and Escambia county, Pensacola, while the state vote in general was slightly in favor of the prohibitionists.

The majority of the "wets" it is claimed, is sufficient to carry the state even if later returns are against local opinion. Nearly half the vote of the state is counted. The full democratic ticket was elected, with but slight opposition.

Democrat in Iowa. In Iowa the democrats claim the election of Claude R. Porter for governor, but this is not conceded. In Wisconsin the election of the republican candidate for governor, Francis E. McGovern, is claimed by a reduced majority and the return of Senator La Follette to the United States senate is assured. In Michigan Chase E. Osborne, the republican candidate for governor, appears to have a safe lead over L. T. Homans, democrat.

lean, by about 15,000 plurality, reversing the previous republican plurality of 8,000 for Governor Fort.

In Massachusetts Eugene H. Foss democratic candidate, has defeated Governor Eben S. Draper, republican candidate for re-election, by about 30,000 plurality, reversing Governor Draper's former plurality of 8,000.

In Connecticut Judge Simon E. Baldwin, democratic candidate, is elected governor over Charles A. Goodwin, republican, by about 4,000 plurality, reversing the previous republican plurality of 16,000.

Harmon Holds Place.

In Ohio Governor Judson Harmon, democratic candidate for re-election, appears to have carried the state by about 50,000 over Warren G. Harding republican candidate.

In New Hampshire Robert H. Bass republican candidate for governor, is leading Charles E. Carr, democratic candidate, by about 6,000 plurality.

In Pennsylvania the election of John H. Tener, republican candidate, for governor is claimed by a large plurality.

In Rhode Island, Governor Pothier, republican candidate, is slightly in the lead over Lewis A. Waterman, democratic candidate, with a plurality much reduced from that of 1909.

In Tennessee the Fusion candidate, Ben W. Hooper, is apparently elected by 15,000 plurality.

Democratic governors have been elected in Alabama and South Carolina.

DEMOCRATS BEATEN IN TENNESSEE.

MAJORITY ABOUT 15,000 VOTES

Vote Throughout the State Remarkably Heavy Except in a Few Counties—Both Sides Claim State Senate.

Summed up, the result of the election appears to be B. W. Hooper, republican and fusionist, governor, by 15,000 to 18,000 majority over Senator Robert L. Taylor, democrat; B. A. Elloe, democrat and fusionist, by a like majority, and a possible small fusion majority in the legislature. Both sides claim the senate, but where the

fusionists have lost in some districts, they have gained in others. The same applies to the democrats; so from present indications there is little change in the complexion of the legislature.

Most of the middle and west Tennessee democratic counties, nearly all of which went for the independent judiciary ticket in August last, returned to the regular column, but by such small majorities that they were overwhelmed by the heavy republican vote in east Tennessee counties. Barring Knoxville, the counties in which are located the larger cities, all went heavily democratic.

In the congressional races, R. V. Austin, republican, appears to have defeated N. W. Hale, independent republican. Sells, republican, defeated Cy H. Lyle, in the first. Z. D. Massey, republican, was elected to fill out the unexpired term of W. P. Brownlow. In the other eight districts the democrats have won, although T. W. Sims, in the eighth, had a hard fight with Murray, republican.

DR. H. H. GRIPPEN GIVEN MORE TIME.

WAS TO HANG TUESDAY.

Through the Efforts of His Lawyers Confirmed Man Is Given Two Weeks More of Life—November 23 New Date of Execution.

It was officially announced Monday that Dr. Hawley H. Crispin, convicted and sentenced to death for the murder of his wife, Belle Elmore, would not be executed Tuesday as originally arranged, for the reason the law provides that two weeks must elapse between the dismissal of an appeal and the carrying out of the sentence.

November 23 is the new date set for the execution. Meartime Solicitor Newton, Crispin's counsel, is drafting a petition for a reprieve.

NO COMPROMISE PROPOSED.

Richland Distillery Case Unsettled. Commission's Work About Over.

Columbia, Nov. 4.—A denial that any official offer of compromise has been made in the Richland distillery case was made here this afternoon.

It is understood that the dispensary winding up its business, will close up its work, and that it will have an interesting report to submit to the General Assembly. The commission has made a number of excellent settlements and, with the payment of \$15,000 by Grabfelder Company, the only large claim that is out standing is said to be that of the Richland Distillery Company. In the first announcements that were made it was said that this claim would run up to nearly three-quarters of a million dollars, but now it appears that later figures have reduced this claim to about \$300,000.

It was also stated that the commission had an offer of a compromise of something around \$100,000. An announcement has just been made that this is a mistake, and that no official offer of compromise and that no such settlement has been authorized. It is figured that the commission, with the co-operation and hard work of Attorney General Lyon, has collected fully half a million dollars in the way of overcharges. The commission and its attorneys are now hard at work trying to push all outstanding claims to settlement or to the Courts.

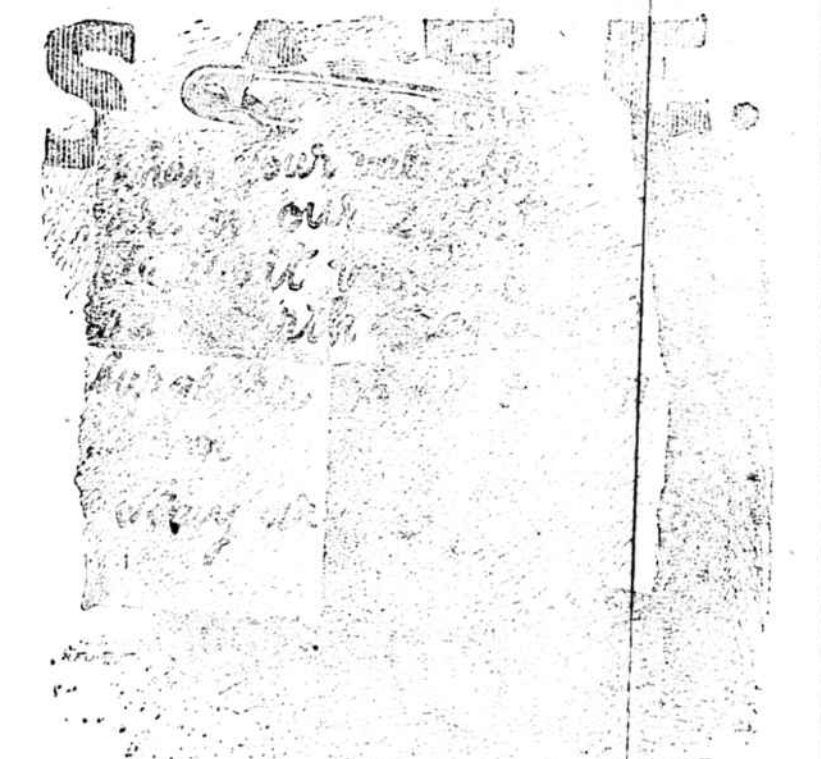
