FLOWER SHOW WAS A GREAT SUCCESS

EXHIBITS MANY AND BEAUTIFUL

Chrysanthemums, Roses, Flowers, Ferns and Fruits in Abundance The Prize Winners.

On Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 31, the ladies of the Civic League held their annual Flower and Fruit Exhibit at the League Hall and although the weather was most inclement the large number of ladies present, some of whom live quite a distance in the country, testified to the general interest taken in this event. Although the display was not as large as usual, owing to the poor season, some of the specimens were the finest ever shown here and a visitor to the State Fair reported that she saw there no roses chrysanthemums, nor egg plants that could compare with those shown at this exhibit.

The real success of the occasion was due however, not to the fact that the few who had specially fine specimens sent them but to the fact that each lady sent what she had "hus showing her interest and furnishing the committee with a variety of ferns and flowers which they arranged artistically in decoration.
