BLEASE DECLARED BY COMMITTEE THE NOMINEE

Other Candidates Leading on Face of Returns Declared Selected on Democratic Ticket.

LYON AND PEEPLES TO MAKE SECOND RACE

Counsel for Judge Jones Withdraws Protest—State Chairman to Name Committee to Draft Suggestions for Change in Primary Rules.

BLEASE THE NOMINEE. Yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock Blease was declared the Democratic nominee for the Governorship. The official figures are: Blease, 72,043; Duncan, 2,166; Jones, 66,548.

B. R. Tillman was declared the nominee for United States Senator. The nomination for the other offices, excepting Attorney General, were announced and a second primary to decide between J. Fraser Lyon and Thomas H. Peebles, for Attorney General, was ordered to be held on the 15th of October. It was declared the sense of the committee that all races yet to be held in any counties ought to take place at the same time the primary for Attorney General is held.

Much discussion was had over a proposition to call a State Convention next year to revise the regulations and rules of the party, but after full discussion this matter was not acted on further than leaving it to the committee, to be appointed by the chairman, to draft the suggested changes and report back to the full committee before January 1, 1914.

Jones' Protest Withdrawn.

After the report of the sub-committee investigating the election and the committee on tabulation, Mr. R. W. Shand, representing Judge Ira B. Jones, withdrew the latter's protest and announced that they had no exceptions to file and no further argument to make.

Mr. John T. Duncan was present but made no statement, and Mr. F. H. Dominick, attorney for Gov. Blease said he had nothing to say except they had gone into the contest and it had come out as they believed it would.

A report exonerating Secretary Christie Bennet of all charges made against him by the Governor, growing out of the matter of tickets for Lee and Pickens counties, was made by a sub-committee through Mr. Manning and adopted by the State committee. Mr. Bennet was commended for his faithfulness and devotion to duty and the fair and impartial manner in which he carried on his duties.

The contest by Messrs. Dial and Talbert, in the matter of United States Senatorships, was dismissed on motion of Mr. Green. Neither of these gentlemen was present today.

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South Carolina State Fair.

Columbia, Sept. 30.—For forty-three years the people of South Carolina have had one place at which they assemble. It is the one time of rejoicing at the prosperity and progress of the State. Every Fall the South Carolina Agricultural and Mechanical Society has held its Fair in Columbia regardless of crops. This year the prosperity of the State and the excellent crop conditions will bring to Columbia October 23 to November 2, probably the largest crowd that they have ever had at a State Fair.

President J. A. Banks, Secretary J. M. Canty and the force of officials have not been saying much but have been hard at work for sometime perfecting the plans and arrangements to give the people who have been faithful and loyal to the Fair a better exhibit than they have ever had.

It is the intention of the authorities to have the new steel structure ready for occupancy for the Fair this year, and in this connection the exhibits of the field crop at the State Fair will be to some extent the basis of the National Corn Exposition. Exhibits that are placed at the Fair will be retained, if they are prize winners, for the Corn Exposition.

The program for the week will of course include horse racing, arena displays and games of football between the University of South Carolina and Clemson, other teams, and many other features.

Authorities of the State Fair have increased the premium list substantially so as to emphasize the agricultural feature of the Fair.

New Road Has Been Completed to Sumter and Train Service Will Soon Begin.

The South Carolina Western railway has just completed its tracks into the city of Sumter. While the track has been laid, the process has not yet been completed, and no schedule has been put on. It is tated that a regular passenger service will be instituted about Oct. 1.

For some months the new railroad has operated passenger service between Florence and McBee. Just as soon as the line to Sumter is inspected by the railroad commission and declared "O. K." the service into Sumter will be instituted.

It is reliably stated that in the near future a force of hands will begin grading an extension from McBee to Sumter, and it is also believed that the road will ultimately be extended from Sumter to Charleston.—Darlington Daily Observer.
