

Chiefs-Braves Fighting Hard For League Flag

Battle At Orangeburg Tonight and in Camden On Saturday Night.

Two games of crucial interest in the Palmetto league are scheduled to be played Friday and Saturday nights this week.

Camden and Orangeburg, racing neck and neck for the Palmetto league pennant of 1948 will stage a battle at Orangeburg Friday night, followed by another clash at the Camden stadium on Saturday night.

Barney Martin, the Braves hurling ace, will pitch in one of the games and Billy Bustle will probably draw the other. Just who will be on the hill for Camden is not known and will probably not be announced until Friday just before game time at Orangeburg.

All of the Camden hurlers are nursing sore arms right now, which is cause for a headache for Manager Johnny Moore.

On Thursday night the scrappy Orangeburg team invades Camden for a bout with the Chiefs. Sug Horton or Dave Chandler may get the nod for chunking this game, but Moore will be primed to step in if the youngsters find the going tough.

After the six games this week, the Chiefs will have but eight more before the season comes to a close. The last appearance of the Chiefs on the home lot will be on Wednesday, August 18, when they tangle with the Lake City team. They play at Hartsville on Friday.

Johnny Moore Is A Sixteen Game Winner In League

Johnny Moore, Camden manager and ace pitcher of the Palmetto baseball loop, won his 16th game of the season when the Chiefs behind a blitzkrieg of homers knocked off the tear-jerking Truckers from Lake City 9 to 1 Friday night at the American Legion stadium here.

And over in Hartsville old Bobo Newsom, baseball's famous king of the highways, hurling for the home hopes for seven innings held the Sumter Pals to three hits and gave Hartsville a 5 to 1 decision.

The Hartsville and Camden wins of Friday enabled them to pull to within half a game behind the league-leading Orangeburg Braves, who bowed to a surprising Kingstree club 4 to 2 at Orangeburg. Bill Bustle, one of the ace chunkers for the Braves, held Kingstree to six hits, but they were bunched for four runs in the sixth inning. The Braves collected 11 hits.

In the game here between Camden and Lake City Moore pitched six-hit ball and only missed a
