

Army Engineer Says BUCKINGHAM DAM PROJECT NOT NECESSARILY COME UP

The Columbia Record carries a story quoting Worth Candrick, chief, engineering division of the United States Army, as saying in answer to an inquiry at the question of a projected dam at Buckingham Landing at the confluence of the Congaree and Wateree rivers will not necessarily be brought up at the hearing on the Wateree River system to be held in Columbia on Sept. 2.

The purpose of the hearing, Mr. Candrick said in his letter, dated August 4, answering The Record's inquiry, is pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Committee on Allocations and Harbors, House of Representatives on December 28, 1948. The resolution follows: "Resolved by the committee on Allocations and Harbors of the House of Representatives, United States, that the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors be, and is hereby requested to review the reports and data submitted on the Santee River System, North Carolina and

South Carolina, printed in Senate Document numbered 189, Seventy-eighth Congress, second session, with a view to determining whether or any modification of the recommendations contained therein is advisable at this time." The letter is continued, "The report to be prepared by this office will include the Santee, Broad and Saluda Rivers. The primary purpose of the hearing is to give the public an opportunity to present their ideas as to what, if any, improvements are desired, and to submit data for or against such im-

It has been considered that it would not be necessary to further discuss the Buckingham Landing project at this hearing, since it was thoroughly covered at the Sumter hearing and the data presented at the Sumter hearing are available and will be used in preparation of the report."

These rules are posted in every book. The commission asks the cooperation of every one in seeing that they are carried out.
